

The rest is history because all these issues have been transformed into reality.

The PMAAAI leadership included all organizations and associations whose members are beneficiaries of the program. After all, we are all brothers, comrades-in-arms, partners with a common shared purpose and advocacy.

This group before your midst, Mr. President, represents a broad cross section of warriors, law enforcers, security and safety officers and crisis managers, past and present, who bear the brunt and burden in confronting all the enemies of the state.

The peaceful and secure environment that the Filipino people are experiencing are the dividends of their sacrifices and tribulations offering life and limb for the sake of survival, freedom, and democracy. It beckons on the dictum "Freedom your right, our responsibility."

These groups represent the best traditions of the uniformed armed services of courage, loyalty, integrity, duty, honor, country, patriotism, and nationalism. These core competences that they manifest represent the core ideology of the men in uniform. The foundation that insures, peace, stability, and prosperity.

The benefits due them represent the interests that they have earned by investing life and limb in risky and life threatening

missions. It took President Duterte to actualize their dreams.

In my own personal note, the Commander-in-Chief is a combat and decisive leader, uncompromising when it comes to the interests of the fighting men in uniform. It is said that 100 dogs led by a lion, will fight like lions, while 100 lions led by a dog will fight like dogs. Truly Mr. President, you have rallied the fighting men to fight like lions. He truly inspires and leads.

The framed letter of thanks follows:

"On behalf of all the military and uniformed personnel (MUP), active and retired including the veterans, and their loved ones, Commanders, Heads and Chiefs of Bureaus and Offices, and Board Chairmen and Presidents of the different uniformed services associations express their utmost gratitude for the numerous measures adopted by the President and Commander-in-Chief to promote their morale and welfare.

Foremost is the President's approval of the increase in the base pay of the MUP in the active service in lieu of provisional allowance and officers' allowance; thereby, entitling them to corresponding increase in their pay and allowances that are pegged to the base pay, as well as the 36-month lump sum and commutation of leave balance of those who retired from the service effective 01 January 2018.

Moreover, the President also approved the resumption of the indexation of pension of retired MUP with respect to the base pay increase, ultimately benefiting more than 220,000 pensioners and their loved ones.

Further, the MUP deeply appreciates the President's Comprehensive Social Benefits Program (CSBP) which he approved on 03 November 2016. The Program aims to effectively deliver social services/assistance to the MUP who become casualties in the line of duty and their families, covering the



period 01 July 2016 onward. The benefits provided under the Program include: special financial assistance, shelter assistance, health care assistance, educational assistance, and employment assistance.

Indeed, the MUP, active and retired including the veterans, and their loved ones are greatly indebted to and will long remember President Rodrigo Roa Duterte for his genuine concern in promoting their morale and welfare.

We have never experienced the demonstration of a deep and sincere caring of a Commander-in-Chief to his troops. Such display of affection has motivated, inspired and moved us to render the best services needed by our people and our country.

Professionalism as a Way of Life

Professionalism is conforming to an ethical standard. It is following a set of principles which, when followed, will promote trust, justice and unity. In a plebe's life, it is following the orders of your squadleader no matter how difficult his night went by, complying to the requirements set for the next day. It is showing no sign of complaint despite his aching muscles, sweating body, and trampled ego. It is living one day at a time, looking at the future and aiming to survive, overcoming the thought of resignation from being a cadet. In all the difficulties, it is not apparent, but we are trained to be professionals, true ladies and gentlemen who will serve the people and uphold the Constitution.

To be professional, an academic degree is just a bare minimum. Beyond it, one has to possess more of the enthralling skills and values that bring out productivity and harmony in the workplace. One must have the ability to self-regulate, be competent and honest, and live with integrity.

The ability to self-regulate is to use the best of one's abilities under pressure while being faithful to the values upheld, displaying a high standard of emotional intelligence. Pressure is what we eat for breakfast and our companion during sleep. Pressure to adopt to the military way of life during plebehood, pressure to survive the academics during yearling year, pressure to lead and mentor during cow year and pressure to graduate during immaculate year. We are taught to be deliberate while being deprived of the stillness of the surroundings. The outcome of this pressure is the development of our emotional intelligence which enables us to be cordial while being strict, to be just while having our biases and to understand enough to have the wisdom to know when to set aside some rules.

To be competent is to posses an in-depth knowledge of your profession, the commitment to improve skills and to achieve proficiency in it. Cadets are chosen based on their potential to become military officers and are required to pass the strict qualifications before being accepted to the Academy. To shape one's competence in leadership requires a combination of physical training, academic excellence and

military science. First we are taught how to be physically strong, to have endurance, to possess speed and agility. Then, while developing one's physique, the mind is also being prepared through instructions in technical and social subjects. It does not stop on physical and academics because along with these are military instructions such as drills, weapons handling and survival skills. Training also does not end during cadetship. It is in fact just an indoctrination that to be competent is a way of life and not just a phase. All throughout one's career, an unending number of schooling, seminars and training continue. Evolving with competency is one's integrity, your humility in accepting that there will always be someone better than you, and your belief that nothing can be achieved without hard work and perseverance.

To be honest and live with integrity is to never compromise values no matter what the results will be and to be accountable for the outcome of your actions. It is never a question whether or not a cavalier is molded into an honorable person because from day one, the Honor Code has been the guiding principle of every cadet. 





The Philippine Military Academy Alumni Association, Inc. (PMAAAI) spearheaded an event to show appreciation to President Rodrigo Roa Duterte who pursued and approved the unprecedented increase in the salaries of the military and other uniformed personnel (MUP). Dubbed as "Sama-Samang Pasasalamat *Para Sa Pangulo,"* the event was held on 4 October 2018 at the Presidential Hall, Malacañang Palace.

The military and uniformed services personnel, active and retired including the veterans, commanders, heads and chiefs of bureaus and offices, and Board Chairmen and Presidents of the different uniformed services associations expressed their utmost gratitude for the numerous measures adopted by the President and Commander-in-Chief to promote their morale and welfare.

Foremost is the President's approval of the Joint Resolution (JR) Number 1 dated 01 January 2018 which amended Executive Order Number 201 s.2016 and finally authorizing the increase in the base pay of the MUP in the active service in lieu of provisional allowance and officers' allowance; thereby, entitling them to corresponding increase in their pay and allowances that are pegged to the base pay such as their longevity pay, hazardous duty pay, flying pay, sea

duty pay, and instructor duty pay, as well as the 36-month lump sum and commutation of leave balance of those who retired from the service effective 01 January 2018.

Moreover, the JR also resumed the indexation of pension of retired MUP with respect to the base pay increase, ultimately benefiting more than 220,000 pensioners and their loved ones. However, the indexation has been suspended for 2018, but the suspension will be lifted effective 01 January 2019.

PETFI Relaxes Policy on Scholarship Guidelines

The new board of trustees of the PMAAA Educational Foundation, Inc. (PETFI) has relaxed the policy on the qualification of scholars. This is in response to a clamor to also support the education of children of those who are not members of the Foundation. Under a new board resolution, the children of non-members of the Foundation are now allowed to avail of its scholarship, with a token amount of stipend in support to their education.

Prior to this new policy, only children of members of the Foundation, who have contributed to it P2,000, and who have died or been incapacitated, can avail of its scholarship. The new policy will start in the current school year 2018-19. Under this policy, the token financial support to the scholar whose father was not a member of the Foundation prior to his death or disability shall only be one-third of the amount being given to a scholar-child of a member of the Foundation.

The grant of a token amount of support to children of non-members of PETFI is subject to the following conditions:

1) the class to which the non-member belongs has donated to the PETFI scholarship fund at least P200,000; the death or disability of the non-member has happened after the donation has been made; and such other conditions as the board may hereafter prescribe.

The present revised stipend rates per school year of PETFI regular scholars are P18,000 for those in the elementary, P24,000 for those in high school and P30,000 for those in college. Accordingly, the stipend rates of children of non-members are P6,000, P8,000 and P10,000 for those in the elementary, high school and college, respectively.

Adoption of the new policy was triggered by the application for scholarship of the son of the late Cav Roberto R Navida '71 from the PNP, who died in October 2016. It turned out that the payment for his membership was made by a classmate three months after his death. So the application for scholarship was denied. The class, which had donated to the Foundation P300,000 for a scholarship fund, appealed for

leniency on the policy for those whose class has donated to its scholarship fund.

In the last election of trustees of the Foundation, new trustees and new officers were elected. And these new trustees supported the relaxation of the policy on acceptance of new scholars. The new trustees are Cavaliers Jose C Lalisan Jr '71, Ricardo C Marquez '82, Noel A Baraceros '86 and Bernard M Banac '92, all from the PNP.

In the organizational meeting that followed, Cav Rosalino A Alquiza '55 was reelected chairman and Cav Anselmo S Avenido Jr '67 was elected president. Marquez was elected vice president and PETFI representative to the PMAAAI board, while Lalisan was elected treasurer. /raa

Before the break of dawn of one cold December morning in the year 2012, hundreds of Army Cavaliers converged at the designated assembly area, standing side by side, keenly listening to the final briefing, eager to lead a throng of thousands of men and women – both soldiers and civilians – who were all suited up, ready to blaze a historic trail for others to follow.

Several moments later, a gunshot was heard followed by the loud roar of a charging phalanx as they crossed their line of departure determined to accomplish their mission. Several hours after that historic gun-start, the PMAAAI's Army Chapter emerged victorious because, aside from generating fund to uplift the morale of Army heroes, they have laid down the foundation for what would later on become an annual tradition.

That undertaking was a brain-child of the Philippine Military Academy Alumni Association Incorporated's Army Chapter intended as a fundraiser for the benefit of battle-casualty soldiers who were then confined at the Army General Hospital.

The engagement area was the Philippine Army's Parade Ground. The runners were dressed in singlet, athletic shorts and running shoes.

Their mission was to launch and complete the first-ever Heroes Run.



The nobility of the cause emanated from the lofty portals of the Academy where every Cavalier was indoctrinated to look after the welfare of our men.

Bestowed with the ability to see beneath the surface and the discernment of what is truly essential, the Cavaliers recognized the reality that those who wear the uniform do not have the monopoly of heroism, that long after their last taps is played, there is an orphaned family whose future we need to secure for we owe it to the fallen to help them not to fall.

Thus, from donating medical items to AGH, the Army Chapter slowly and deliberately transitioned to donating the proceeds to AFPEBSO and HERO Foundation to help sustain the scholarships not only of Army orphans but also those of their fellow service members – airmen, sailors and Marines – who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Moreover, above and beyond that noble intention, it served as one of those times' limited venues for civilians to express their support and appreciation to the sacrifices of their soldiers for our country and people.

With the passing of years, similar to every Cavalier's trait of being able to adjust to changes brought about by the fluidity of the operational environment, the event expanded from being a single-venue undertaking to a simultaneous multiple-release race held in strategic areas of our country's major island groups.

The "expansion" started in 2014 when Army Cavaliers assigned in Iloilo stepped-up to the challenge to widen the advocacy's reach. Indeed, it was a tall order, however, the positive attitude and indomitable spirit instilled within the Academy's portals allowed them not to falter, to stay the course and to attain the objective.

The success of that year's Heroes Run radiated and touched the sense of volunteerism among the Cavaliers assigned in other parts of the country.

Taking cue from Iloilo, Davao followed suit in 2015, who were then joined by Baguio the following year. Completing the six simultaneous venues of the 6th Edition were Naga and Cebu whose participants comprised a considerable percentage of the 9,585

recorded runners, a whopping 60% increase from the previous year's record.

As if that was not enough, the Army Cavaliers once again pushed themselves to the limit when the 7th Heroes Run last October 7 was held simultaneously in 13 venues across the archipelago – Taguig, Baguio, Isabela, Tarlac, Legazpi, Iloilo, Cebu, Bohol, Catbalogan, Tagum, Cagayan De Oro, Cotabato and Pagadian City – which attracted an estimated number of 13,000 runners, a turn-out that is equivalent to about 500% increase from the recorded participants when the activity was launched in 2012.

Similar to last year, the annual endeavor was broadcasted live to and from those areas using available technology which further strengthened the bond among the fine gentlemen and ladies of the long gray line by giving it a festive mood similar to our annual ritual on the hallowed grounds of Borromeo Field.

The innovation was a remarkable display of the unquenchable thirst for continuous improvements and insatiable quest for excellence which our Alma Mater imbibed upon her sons and daughters.

By leaps and bounds, the 7th Heroes Run was definitely bigger and grander compared to its humble maiden edition.

The dignity and honor behind the intention and purpose, however, remains the same – to recognize the heroes amidst the heroes, to become heroes of our country's heroes.

Riding on the momentum brought about by the success of the Campaign for the Liberation of Marawi, this year's Heroes Run was dedicated in honor of those who fought for the freedom of that Islamic City.

Truly, this tradition – founded by the Army Cavaliers – is a fitting tribute to the brave men and women who leave their familes behind, who go where others dare not go and whose greatest honor is to put their lives on the line in the name of service to God, flag, country and people.



For the past 10 years I have been going back and forth to Canada residing in Ottawa, its capital, for as long as six to eight months of the year and I have observed how federal form of government works. These are some of my observations:

1. There has always been continuing conflicts between the federated state (FS) and the central government (CG) on authority, powers and responsibility, on many matters notably on control and sharing of wealth of natural resources, infrastructure development and many other domestic concerns like taxes, health and education. One big issue is the project of the CG on the laying of gas pipes from sources of natural gas that will traverse the lands of the FS and sites of indigenous people. This national project that will increase gas exports has been stalled for many years due to disagreements between the CG and FS. Imagine if our government will put up a railway or additional highways in Mindanao that will traverse the Muslim controlled territories or other infrastructure like an international airport in Luzon. Most likely the regional government or state to be set up will dip its hands on these projects.

2. Conventionally, in a federal form the CG has exclusive power and responsibility over foreign relations and external defense and the FS is concerned on domestic matters. But in actual practice the CG interferes or has some say on domestic matters since it grants or provides support and subsidies to the FS. The latter will always run to the former for more funding to support health, education and other services and particularly in periods/ times of disaster and emergency. In a country like ours with very limited funds and resources what will happen is worsening the inefficient and unintegrated rendering of government services. - 3. The people is burdened by additional taxes. The CG imposes a sales tax of 12% while the FS collects 3 to 4%. In an economy like ours which is vulnerable to inflation this is an additional expense. It is also possible that the FS in our country will impose other kind of taxes to provide for funds to administer its own bureaucracy, provide services and fund development projects.
- 4. Despite broad delineation and separation of powers of the CG and FS, there have been disputes between the two even bringing many matters to the courts for resolution. We are known as people with the inclinations and disposition to debates and disputes. In an adversarial society where government officials eyeing for media mileage, fringe benefits and bonanza and lawyers and pseudo lawyers take sides, invariably bring matters to the heavily clogged judiciary which will take years and even decades to resolve. So sound legislations are sidelined and projects that bring benefit the people are delayed.
- 5. As observed by Senator Angara and further amplified and affirmed by top NEDA and Finance officials, the transition to federal system will cost additional trillion of pesos. The

FSs will be responsible for providing education, health, police and other services to their people in their own states. At present, the national government mostly, if not totally, fund these services.

But a significant and disturbing consideration is that the attention of the national government will be diverted to how to transition to and fund a federal form. Hence matters like anti-poverty programs, generating jobs and solving the criminality and peace and order problems will be sidelined. New positions will be created in the regional state. Many aspiring politicians will see a seat in its legislative assembly. So, more politicians to emerge and more political squabbles to happen. More taxes will be imposed since the members of the new assembly will have their own pork barrel.

I can see those who will benefit in a federal system are the political dynasties who are not entrenched in positions and will lord their respective fiefdoms for generations to come. Lincolnian democracy 'of a government by, of and for the people will be a dream for most Filipinos.

The salutary benefit of having a federal form is that more

powers will be devolved to the local regional government. Hence the responsibility to initiate, fund and implement projects will be at the this level.

From history, we learned that federal forms of government took centuries to evolve and in certain countries after a violent struggle. U.S. underwent a four-year civil war and suffered some 800,000 casualties before the Union could be firmed up and consolidated. Federal states like Yugoslavia disintegrated along ethnic lines. Quebec, a French speaking province (a sub-state of federal Canada) held a non-binding plebiscite in which its residents were asked whether to secede and be independent. The separatists lost by a slim margin. More recently, Cartagena, a province in a state led by its Prime Minister, wanted to separate and become independent. But Spain, which for centuries was a dominant world power, has enshrined in its Constitution that the state is 'Indissoluble and Indivisible'. Its government had the Prime Minister of Cartagena who sought asylum in Belgium charged and arrested.

Let us continue debating the issue of whether to change from a centralized to a federal form of government for the Filipinos.

This paper will not delve on the legal issues of implementing a military government. It will discuss the foundation of military culture and its response in cases when the political status quo is challenged.

In some of his public addresses, the President expressed his desire to resign. He has further stated that if this situation ever happens, one of the options is to establish and call for a military junta to take over the affairs of the government.

A military junta is a mode that establishes the takeover of governmental functions by a purely military structure or a military-civilian partnership. In both cases, the military authority generally prevails since it has the means to influence and control the situation. It sets the tone of leadership, decision-making and governance.

In a military junta, additional responsibilities is burdened and reposed in the military establishment apart from its traditional roles that include the administration of laws, resolving conflicts among social, political and economic groups, and domestic and foreign relations. It presupposes that it possesses added core competencies and the facilities to rapidly assume an immediate takeover because a lull will spawn emerging conflicting groups to contest any takeover.

The value of the military establishment consists both its core competence and core ideology. Core competence defines the AFP's capabilities where the organization is usually good at. It is a strategic concept. The military's core competence

revolves around its use of force. They are experts in the application and management of conflict and violence. They are responsible in protecting the nation against external attacks, and the government and the people against internal violence.

The military is trained to obey orders that emanates from the Commander-in-Chief down to the chain of command. From the time they take their oath until they shed their uniform after retirement, their milieu is replete with an unquestioned obedience to command. Consciously or unconsciously, they will always follow orders to the latter.

Why is this value essential to a soldier? In war, "There is no substitute for victory," said General Douglas MacArthur. Hesitation to act decisively in combat will result in a disastrous defeat. This mindset is greatly ingrained in every soldier.

The military's institutional strength is based on cohesiveness, monopoly of force, and a stable organizational structure solidified by a chain of command. Another military character is a rigid decision-making process that cannot adjust fast enough to different modes of social, political, and economic developments.

Core ideology is defined as the enduring character of an organization, a consistent identity that transcend across generations, technological developments, management innovation and even leadership personalities. Military ideology comprises the total mindset of the officers and noncommissioned corps towards society and politics.

According to the military scholar Samuel Huntington, the military profession has three characteristics, namely, expertise, social responsibility, and corporateness. Interpreted in more liberal terms, the core ideology of the military manifests stability and shuns compromises.

Are the core competencies and core ideology of the military institution enough to lead the government, if a military takeover ever happens? Government affairs can be too complicated to be assumed by an armed component.

During the Martial Law period, 1972-1986, the military had a taste of limited political governance exposure. But this assumption of civilian posting did very little for the military mindset to be challenged. Proofs of these are the two People Power revolutions. In both cases, the military all had the chances to easily grab power. Instead, they engineered the smooth transition to a new government.

This phenomenon only expresses that its core competence and core ideology remained intact, despite the wide latitude of options to take-over the power structure when given the chance.

After Martial Law, only a handful of retired military personnel were drafted in civilian government, the highest being a cabinet secretary. The performance of these government positions had never been assertive nor imposing. They have remained true professionals. You cannot change a military culture overnight. Loyalty to duly constituted authority are deeply embedded in their value system. A military professional is always expected to carry out the commands of any civilian group that assumes legitimate authority from the state. The military establishment throughout history has always acquiesce to the control of the civilian political leadership. Civilian control has always responded positively to the direction of the civilian leaders of the government. By this nature of military-civilian leadership, the balance of power is assured.

If there are changes in the government outside of the constitutional process through a presidential fiat, the military may take over the executive, legislative, and judicial functions of the government. Some civilians consider any military intervention as illegitimate. By the very nature of this inherent burden, it is preposterous to assume a positive change.

One factor is acceptance. The society, currently populated with millennials who were brainwashed continuously with the negative effects of Martial Law even to the extent of disinformation, has been shaped with this mindset. Clash of generational mindsets will emerge with any option that is tainted with military character. Contending political parties will exhaust all means to ensure that their power will not be diluted.

Power corrupts, and every means to maintain and sustain it will be resorted to by any means. With this scenario, you are starting the new rule with a problem.

Patience is the least of the virtues of a military man. He craves for combat, for action, for active and positive leadership direction. If there is a change in governance outside the constitutional process, violence will erupt. Clash of political interests will emerge. Control will be unpredictable. Military patience may taut the soldier to use force that may create disorder if civilian challenges their authority. The military might interpret non-cooperation and non-conformance as a threat to their newly found role. Threat can feed anger which will escalate into physical confrontation and clash of forces in the streets. Alienation from the people is a strong argument against military rule.

Another mode is military-civilian partnership where important legislative and judicial functions will continue to function with military supervision. This happened during Martial Law wherein military superiors were posted and assigned in essential government agencies and industries. It was effective for a while by transferring military expertise and efficiency into the bureaucracy. It further restored order and discipline and the concept of a law-abiding citizen to society. The factors and situation during that time are far different now.

The President has been very generous and overly gracious to the men in arms. Increase in their salaries have upgraded their social status in society. The newly found position has given them more dignity and honor worthy of being identified as a military professional.

On a personal note, therefore, they can never be coerced or intimidated to initiate the establishment of a military junta.





My daughter asked me why was Martial Law declared by President Marcos? I said, I can only tell you my own version of the story as I saw it. It came into my awareness that with the many stories told about Martial Law, which among them is the truth? The recent burial of the late President Marcos at the Libingan ng Bayani brought about the divisiveness of the Filipinos once again and the young people who were not even born during the period are being dragged into the issue.

AN EPISODE IN PHILIPPINE HISTORY

To my recollection, Martial Law as I saw it as a high school student in 1965 to 1969, there were already mass rallies and boycotts of classes in campuses. The height of student activism came about when I was in fourth year at the University of Baguio during the school year of 1968-69. Little did I know then that Jose Maria Sison, a UP professor, organized the Communist Party of the Philippines and started mobilizing underground mass organizations to oust President Marcos. In the student/ youth sector, the Kabataang Makabayan (KM) initiated the agitation-propaganda activities by street rallies shouting slogans like, "down with Marcos-US dictatorship, stop US imperialism, fascism, feudalism, and bureaucrat-capitalism". Likewise, other sectoral organizations in the Labor, transport, professional, and

even the movie industry, were already infiltrated by communist cell groups in a concerted effort to topple the democratic government we have and change to communism following the Russian and Chinese models inspired by Marx, Lenin and Mao Tse Tung, respectively. Bombing and insurrection were massive and later on these incidents became known as the first quarter storm authored by the communist movement.

But as a 16-year old boy then, I was not truly aware of the real motives and intentions of all these anti-Marcos rallies. I was more focused on finishing my studies and probably get a job for a brighter future. In the first place, I was not so concern about ideology or changing the status quo in society unlike my cousin Abraham who actively joined the KM and heightened his Communist leanings inspired by Joma Sison, Jalandoni, Bernabe Buscayno, Rolly Kintanar and Cesar Taguba to name a few. Nevertheless, unwittingly, I took part in rallies for classes were suspended giving us respite in classroom activities. I then recalled that my cousin joined the NPAs in Cagayan Valley in the early 70s but died in an encounter with soldiers in San Mariano, Isabela.

For me, in my second year as an Engineering student, I became a PMA cadet in April 1971, three months after Lt Victor Corpus, PMA '67 who was then a tactical officer, raided the PMA armory,

absconded the firearms and subsequently joined the NPAs in Isabela on Dec 29, 1970. He was later on tagged as the first rebel soldier of the AFP in the modern era. PMA class 71, where Senators Lacson and Honasan belong, were the graduating class in March 1971. As incoming plebes, our "reception" as the new batch of the Cadet Corps Armed Forces of the Philippines (CCAFP) was delayed for four days on April 4, 1971 for reasons not clear to us then. Fresh from civilians with ages from 17 to 22 years old, we had our summer camp training for two months to prepare us for cadet life for the next four years. We were then isolated from the developments outside PMA grounds and focused on our routine of academic training and Saturday parades and inspections. We were not aware that the CPP/NPA/NDF was already advancing their insurgent activities nationwide and the MNLF/BMA under Nur Misuari, a colleague of Joma Sison as professors at UP, too began their armed rebellion to separate Mindanao from the Philippines, as an offshoot of the Jabidah Massacre as alleged. As yearlings (second year) then, we received news that new graduates from PMA '72 were deployed in rebel infested areas all over the country and their first casualty was the late Lt Visayo Luspo PAF who was on OJT with the Philippine Constabulary and was killed in an encounter with NPAs in Sierra Madre in a combat operation to intercept NPA weapons smuggled by MV Karagatan in Palanan, Isabela sometime in July 1972. With these developments, Martial Law was declared on Sept 23, 1972.

Although we were shocked with the news, to our young minds, we were optimistic that by the time we graduate three years later, the situation should have improved by then.

But contrary to our expectations, as first class cadets (fourth year) in 1974, while we were rendering parade in Luneta in connection with the Miss Universe beauty pageant won by Miss Amparo Munoz of Spain, news in the parade formation spread that the Navy group of PMA '74 who were returning from their OJT on ground operations with the Philippine Marines were ambushed by MNLF in Tandu Bato, Luuk, Sulu and several of them were killed as they were to report back to the Navy to pursue their Naval career.

This incident saddened us as news also spread that we are going to be graduated earlier before the end of 1974 to be sent to Mindanao to join the combat operations against the Muslim rebels in Sulu. Plans pushed through but we have to wait until February 17, 1975 for our commencement which was still a month earlier than the traditional March Week ceremony. At least, by the time we received our Diplomas from President Marcos, we became officially members of PMA class 1975 not class 1974B had we graduated two or three months earlier.

Expectedly, we were all sent to Mindanao and for me, as a 22-year old Army Lieutenant, I joined the 24th Infantry Battalion then based in Isabela, Basilan but before I reported there in March 1975, I was told to act as the survivor officer of the late Lt. Michael Omengan PA, PMA '74, and to escort his cadaver to his hometown in La Trinidad, Benguet. Unfortunately, he was my squad leader during our cadet days and seeing him dead at the first meeting after graduation was quite traumatic. I was informed that his own soldier killed him when he tried to pacify the latter but went amuck killing six others before he was subdued. Nevertheless, after his burial, I reported to my Battalion and joined the patrols in our area of responsibility particularly the municipalities of Isabela, Lantawan, Maluso, and my first patrol area was in Tairan, Lantawan as platoon leader of C Coy to run after the MNLF group of Talib Congo and Jerry Salapuddin

(He later became Congressman and Governor of Basilan). About a month later, I heard that my classmate Lt. Edward Tolentino of 36IB died in an encounter with Moro rebels in Tumatangis, Sulu together with our upperclassman Lt. Franklin Nerez of PMA 74. A few weeks later, another classmate Lt George Quisido was also killed in Sulu. After a year of combat operations, three other classmates likewise died in Sulu also namely: Lts. Sofronio Pasiliao and Dominador Makinano, both from the Army, while the late Lt. Antonio Viray PC was ambushed in nearby Pata Island. Other classmates who died in other areas included the late Lt. Alberto Villanueva PC who was killed by NPA assassins in Davao, Lt. Jose Monico Garcia PC who was ambushed by NPAs in Zamboanga del Norte, and the late Lt. Sergio Alcubilla PC who was murdered by NPAs in Bataan.

Their deaths while still in their early 20's were the ultimate sacrifice they gave for country and people. Did they fight for a wrong reason for defending a duly constituted government being threatened by Anarchist? Or were they Human rights violators to those Communist and Moro rebels who planned to take over the government? You are the judge.

As these incidents are clear manifestation of heightened rebellion, I can personally attest to the fact that the proclamation of Martial Law was justified. The untimely death of my Mistahs at the start of our budding military career were clear indicators of the existence of a state of lawlessness in those times from 1971 to the early 1980s. It could not be possible that the government or the AFP initiated these fratricidal wars as the real issue was the change of our democratic way of life to communal living espoused by Joma Sison and his Communist cohorts and the Moros under Misuari and Hashim Salamat pursuing their agenda of separating Mindanao from the entire Philippine archipelago.

Martial law thwarted their insurrection and armed rebellion but they went underground and pursued a protracted struggle with the intent of wearing out the fighting will of the AFP and other instrumentalities of our Democratic institutions. Nevertheless, Martial law lasted only for nine years from 1972 to 1981 not 20 years as claimed by the biased media favouring opposing political interest groups in tactical alliance from the leftist sectors of this fractionalized nation.

From my standpoint, I and my colleagues in the AFP served the interest of this Republic by defending it in strict adherence to the rule of law. As a Military officer, when I took my oath of office, It was clear to my mind to support and defend the constitution and protect the territorial integrity of the country. Regardless of who sits in Malacanang, our focus is to abide by the people's mandate and obey the duly elected authorities.

Now you ask me, was Marcos solely responsible for Martial Law? Were there really victims of Martial Law or injustices committed against the people? Marcos is just one man, the implementors like me and the other government institutions just did our share of our respective mandates and we are all aware of these responsibilities. The anti-Marcos group who uses their biased media cannot fool or brainwash society as in the long run the truth will come out. Indeed, the editorial of Business Mirror dated Dec 13, 2016 and the Pilipino Mirror dated Dec 19, 2016 respectively revealed it and I quote:

WHAT EXACTLY ARE YOU FIGHTING FOR?

Forgive these questions, but we can help but ask them of this country's so-called revolutionaries in the New People's Army (NPA). Recent "Revolutionary" activities of the NPA, the latest in

the very long list of questionable, if not outright, atrocious acts, make us wonder what kind of guerrilla war they are really doing. So we ask, whose side, which people (in its acronym) and what kind of ideology are they really fighting for? And when do rebels become plain bandits and criminals?

During the recent inauguration of a new power plant in Bukidnon, President Duterte asked NPA rebels not to damage energy and communication facilities in the country if companies refuse to pay their so-called revolutionary tax.

In a story published in this paper last week (Ceasefire Not Working for Banana Plantations in Mindanao), banana growers in Mindanao complained about the extortion activities being conducted by the NPA rebels against them and other agricultural plantations, bus companies, private contractors, quarrying operators, public market store owners and small entrepreneurs, seemingly taking advantage of the government's unilateral ceasefire.

"The amount range from as low as P5000.00 to as high as P5 million a month. If we pay, we will lose our shirts and would be forced to close shop; if we refuse to pay, our lives and that of our family members will be in danger," said a businessman in Toril, a district in Davao City.

The hardest hit are banana plantations, with one banana company having to close its plantation in Surigao del Sur a few months ago after losing more than P20 million to the NPA's in burning their equipment and packing plants since the start of its operation in 2010. The firm's decision expectedly resulted in worsening of joblessness in the area.

Dole-Stanfilco had also shut down its plantation and packing plants in Surigao del Sur after the NPA torched container trucks early this year, because the company refused to pay revolutionary taxes.

We are sure their leaders have an elaborate explanation of their notorious activities, but let's face it, as much as they want to divert it to other issues, this has everything to do about money. It's plain extortion, which the NPA has gotten very good at over the years.

Their extortion activities have hurt the economy and have made investors and businessmen wary of operating outside the country's urban centers because of the risk of insurgent attacks. Ironically, these are the poorest areas that need the most investment and development.

Could it be that the NPA wants to keep these areas poor so they could keep blaming and fighting the government, in order to justify their continued relevance and existence?

Surely, the NPA can't hope to win any kind of sympathy or solidarity to their cause by burning farm equipment, buses, power lines, and cell sites. And surely, the NPA can't hope to get any respect for their armed struggle if they launch offensives and hit businesses, both big and small, that ordinary workers depend on for their livelihood and everyday existence.

Such extortion activities certainly put the name of their revolutionary movement in bad light. If that is all what is revolution all about, then the NPA rebels are no different from thugs, gangsters, terrorists and anarchists.

By the way, where do their so-called revolutionary taxes go anyway? Does even a portion of the money they get from politicians and businessmen go to, say financing livelihood projects or the constructions of waterwells, schools, hospitals or any kind of projects to help the poor masses they are supposed to be fighting for? Because if it just go to the pockets of their cadres,

then, again, it is plain and simple extortion, a protection racket—pay us and you won't have any unfortunate accidents.

The NPAs keep blaming the government for stalled peace talks, but, like the late rap artists Francis Magalona said in his iconic song "Kaleidoscope World" you can't talk peace and have a gun. (Unquote).

In a small surviving group of nonagenarians, no one is expected to volunteer to be the class president, and more so as class secretary. So the class adopted the "turo-turo" system of selection such that in any class meeting where the attendance is considered the majority, anyone can point to anyone to take over these two positions. There would be resistance but in the end a kind and brave soul would accept the challenge. Mike Villamor is that one guy. He has removed "NO" from his vocabulary. For this, the class is very grateful and hopeful Mike would be President for life.

There was no taker for the position of Secretary. Every time I received my copy of THE CAVALIER, I would feel a sense of guilt when I see the column reserved for CL '51 empty. I decided to fill the void by contributing an article to the class call on any subject which would interest the members of the PMAFFI. I admit my limitations in writing knowing that my serious attempt was to write the required thesis in two of my past post graduate degrees and to write the speeches of three of my former Commanding Generals.

Since I am not the Secretary of CI '51, and perhaps for contributing to the Class Call, I received an honorific label from THE CAVALIER as Historian. I am not and I don't deserve the title. There is only one Historian in the entire PMAFFI, and that is Dr. (Col) Cesar Pobre of the "BINANATAN" Class of '52. He is the professionally certified and recognized Historian who has written many books in collaboration with the Philippine Veterans Administration Office of DND. It has been my wish to

acquire even only 5% of his ability to write and his grit to do intensive research work.

On the subject of label, as I received the label of Historian, I also labeled my classmate Cesar Miel as Mr. "Basket Ball" in the July-Aug issue of the magazine. For SAR Miel who is barely 5'5" could out-run, outjump, out-maneuver the tallest man in the Squad. No basketball game was exciting if SAR was not playing.

I have diverted too long from my preliminaries. In this issue, I will feature the "lover boy" of the BANAT Class- a more interesting and flavor-full label. Brig General Prudencio (BEBS) Regis personifies youth for a man who will be 93 years old on 23 October 2018. What is his secret? He has found his fountain of youth. If by chance any of my readers would take his lunch at the Cp Aguinaldo Commissioned Officers Open Mess where the PMAFFI holds its monthly fellowship meeting, he will not miss this wonderful couple. Bebs would come in escorted by a young, sweet charming, cute "little doll" who can be my "APO SA TUHOD". It is unavoidable that the officers inside would look at the couple with envy and curiosity.

Bebs' label as "lover boy" aptly describes him and is traced back to Pruda, his first wife, his OAO. Bebs is a very religious man and he loved Pruda deeply, truly and devotedly. Pruda was his cadet femme and their love for each other was sealed in the Ring Hop when she put on his class Ring. We thought that they would take the plunge immediately after graduation like our five other classmates but delayed their marriage until Aug. 6, 1951. They were blessed with seven children, two of whom made generals (Better copies than the original).

Then the tragedy of loneliness as a widower when Pruda passed away. It is often said that losing the woman you truly love has varying reactions for men. I can only speculate that Bebs developed a negative feeling to a woman and looked at her only as an object for physical satisfaction. For a virile, hot-blooded WARAY he didn't have to look for them, they would go to him.

But all things come to an end when he met ELMA, the youthful angel in his life who rekindled and reinvigorated his love and devotion to a woman. It is to the credit of ELMA that for all her youthfulness she has adjusted well and socially with the BANAT survivors and their spouses.

Let me backtrack. Who is Bebs? As a cadet, he was active in many extracurricular activities, but more significantly was his membership with the Gymnastics Club and Boxing Club. It was expected that he would choose the infantry as his branch of service. To prepare himself for his stint in Korea, he took up the Scout Ranger Course. He became a platoon leader with the 19th BCT (PEFTOK). Upon his return to the Philippines, he rejoined his Scout Ranger Regiment and later he was transferred to the PMA to assume both instructor and administrative duties.

I see no set pattern in the assignments of Bebs which reflects the character of the man to want to be everywhere every time. How he was able to place himself in all levels of the military hierarchy and DND, including the Mutual Defense Board, perplexes me. Surprisingly, he joined the Philippines Constabulary and became a Provincial Commander, then came back to GHQ, AFP as the "Governor" of Camp Aguinaldo, and Vice Commander of the AFP LOGCOM. He retired as Commandant of the Command General Staff School.

After retirement he resumed his passion to be everywhere. He became VP of JAI ALAI, VP of the Rotary Club, President of the Enterprise Security Agency. He was with the governing bodies of PADPAO, PEFTOK Veterans Association, AGFO and the Class of '51.

Bebs was fortunate as a WARAY during Martial Law. The seat of power was more on the WARAY Camp than in the BATAC enclave. Bebs as the first post-war general from Leyte, could not be unnoticed by the fabulous IMELDA and the Romualdes clan. Inevitably, he orbited within the group but Bebs never abused his position.

In the Golden Sword of Class '51, Bebs was characterized as one person who

likes taking risks and basks in his success. He talks quietly, smiles frequently, dances gracefully and lives life to the fullest. To the widowers of the BANAT Class, he invites them, "Come, follow me".

Gen Tony Lukban, our man from Charlie BCoy, CCAFP and PAF fighter pilot, died of cardiac arrest on 1 August 2018, a day before his 87th birthday while viewing an interview of Sen. Ping Lacson in his Facebook. His death was nothing special. He just retreated inside himself and spent his last hours with his own private thoughts. As quietly as he left us, the class however paid tribute to him at his necro services on 4 August 18 at the St. Peter's Chapel in Quezon Ave. emceed by Levy Malto with Romy David as the lead eulogist, followed by Mel Goyena and four members of the family. The response was made by Atty. Gerard Lukban, the youngest son. Ching Corachea, the class prexy, closed the affair by turning over to Tess, the PHP 40,000.00 and PHP 50,000.00 abuloys from the class and PMAAAI, respectively. He left behind his OAO wifey Tess and five children with their respective families. The next day, his body was cremated ready for the 3 pm turnover of the urn and the flag. Full military honors were rendered by the PAF contingent of honor guards and band. He is the first casualty of the class in the current year and the 29th among the 51 that left Loakan in 1956.



he Board of Trustees met on July 6 and again on August 23. Mel presided the meetings attended by Willy, Art C., Art J., Volts, Sony, Alex and Nori. On both occasions, the board took positive cognizance of our highly successful golden anniversary celebration in Baguio and on-time launch of our "50 YEARS AND BEYOND" during our Anniversary Ball on March 24 at Discovery Primea Hotel in Makati. In attendance also were representatives of classes 69, 70 and 71. Some of them had many good words about our celebration most especially the production of the Golden Sword and the manner it was distributed on the day of our 50th Anniversary.

Mel recommended to the members that aside from the Thanksgiving Mass and the Christmas fellowship which is scheduled at 5 P.M. on December 9, 2018 at AGFO Social Hall , the 2018 Annual General Membership Meeting and Election will discuss the following:

- Status of the Class Fund which presently amounts to P1.5 million. The

Class significantly spent less than budgeted for our 50th anniversary events. Class funds however, are no longer deposited in capital contributions due to stricter AFPSLAI and PNSLAI policies and now earn only 3-5% in savings deposits. Projected annual income from the Class Fund is therefore projected to be well below our regular annual budget of around P350,000. These point to the need to raise CMs' contributions, KKBs and pursue other cost savings.

- Decision of the BOT to reduce the grant to heirs of departing CMs from P100,000 to P40,000. With the PMAAAI 'abuloy' of P60,000, each departing CM will therefore receive a total of P100,000 from both sources. This matter will be submitted for confirmation as part of the President's annual report during the annual General Assembly meeting on Dec 9, 2018. Other options on and aspects of Fund usage are welcome subject to justifications and other details.

Other suggestions for future class activities came from Amy Palmos (as reported by Sony). He suggested for a joint



celebration of annual golden wedding anniversaries and renewal of vows of CMs and their respective spouses as a Class activity. This was considered a good idea but would need more details on their mechanics. Art Carrillo proposed more fellowships especially during CMs' birthdays. Celebrants are encouraged to invite and host/co-host on their own terms.

Her vision was to see an all-inclusive preventive-focused and affordable health care delivery in the Philippines. Her goal was to advocate for the legislation and

institutionalization of Advanced Practice Nursing in the Philippines.

Her objective, which actually became the focus of her doctoral dissertation, was to model a barangay-oriented clinic employing the competencies of Mastersprepared nurses trained as Advanced Practice Nurses (APNs) explicitly targeting adult patients with hypertension.

After a frequent night-candle-burning three and a half years of academics and a year of intensive researches, interviews, writing and re-writing dissertation, she finally graduated in June 2017 and obtained the right of adding a new title, **PhD (Nursing)** after her name – quite an

accomplishment considering many odds.



the candle at the same time while making their wishes . . .



Despite the busy schedules as Commanders in the OPAREA, or as Staffs in our respective Headquarters, and as private citizens indulged in our respective businesses, the excitement for the Homecoming activities next year can be gleamed in the eyes of each one of us. The pressures and stress as we prepare for this momentous occasion is all worth it, as everyone in our class wouldn't want to miss celebrating with our Mistahs, and with our families, back where it all started... PMA.

In retrospect, 25 years is long enough to look back and try to recall all the things that transpired for us as individuals, and as a group of teenagers when were received in PMA last 01 April 1990. Likewise, 25 years is short enough, as our age finally catches up with all of us, and the remaining years of our service both in public and private lives can now be easily counted in our fingers. Surprisingly, through all those years, for most of us almost hitting the golden years, and for some who already reached their golden years (very few), we never forget the "Life that binds us all together". The life spent in the academy, as confused plebe, as magan yearling, as a rotting (academically) cow, and as a relaxing firstie. We each have our own lives as an Army, Air Force, Navy, Coast Guard, and Marines that we may share amongst our respective groups. But the memorable years we spent in PMA will always be the common denominator that defines who we are as Bantay Layans from the PMC Class of 1994.

Agree or disagree, in my humble opinion, each Class from PMA will always have their unique identity borne from a significant event or experience in the academy. These events may be during the early part of their cadet days, middle part, or for some during their last year in PMA. These events may be within PMA, or even outside of PMA probably involving the whole of our country. With some classes, major reforms within the academy may have provided a stigma that defines the identity of their class, while for some, it may be a historic event in the nation like changes in government, etc.

During our plebehood, the July 1990 earthquake was a major disaster that hit Baguio. That event not only shook the

ground where we all stood during that athletic formation, but it shook our lives, our humanity, and our drive. That event provided the stigma giving a deeper meaning and understanding of why we serve. We all served with our upperclassmen during those times for the rescue and relief operations in Bagiuo City. But as confused plebes, with barely four months of active service, that experience opened in our minds a new reality, a deeper purpose. For several weeks, instead of Mase Mase, memorizing plebe knowledge, doing stuffs that a normal plebe would do, our plebe lives were different. Instead, we were rescuing people trapped in rubbles, we were using our bare hands and risking our lives going thru ruins looking for survivors, we were packing relief goods and helping distribute to all the victims. For the first time, we felt like soldiers, we felt who ought to be, and it was a great feeling, much different from the stressful life of a normal plebe. And the best part through all those weeks, we were aloud not to head up, and we can talk tagalong to our upperclassmen. Nope... it's not the best part, but it was worth it. Seriously, the 1990 earthquake during our plebehood, for most of us, changed our lives....not just as individual, but as members of PMA Class of 1994. For me, it was a major event that that defined who we are as soldiers now, and who we will be as soldiers in the service of our country.

For almost 25 years, after we graduated from the academy on 06 March 1994, can

we categorically state who are we as a class? What is our identity? Have we lived up to our name of Bantay Laya or Guardians of Freedom? Thankfully, I can vividly recall how quickly we altered or class name from "PINAGPALA" (Blessed) to "Bantay Laya". How can we forget how our upperclassmen immediately tried to imprint our PINAGPALA class name in our behinds... Whew!!! Who would ever think we are Blessed with such a name as PINAG-PALA???

I, for myself, cannot categorically say "who we are as class." It all depends on how the Filipino people, and the government we all served would see us a class and as individuals. It all depends on the reputations we built as seen in the eyes and testimonies of both our seniors and our juniors.

It may be difficult to state who we are Class 94 Pmayers, but we all know what we did and what we continue to do. For 28 years after that horrible earthquake. Class 94 members are still at it... serving as Commanders in the field, as staff, as planners, as businessmen, as pilots, etc. Serving with pride and utmost dedications, performing beyond expectations, giving more than 100% of we are to serve the country that we love, for our God, for our families, for our Alma Mater. We may not know yet our identities as Class 94, but we all know that We Did and What We will continue to do will be a testament to our name, a True Bantay Layan.

had seven children: Robert, Sheryl, Rene Allan, Vicente III, Douglas Michael, Raymond and Joy.


BGEN ERNESTO F LUMANG, JR '71 01 December 1948 – 7 October 2018


