

But the emergence of additional threats emanating from other fronts, like the non-passage of the Bangsamoro Basic Law which could bring back the MILF and MNLF to the mountains, the possibility of a constitutional crisis due to the power plays of the three branches of government that pit them against each other and dysfunctions in the political system, may just be too tough to handle by the defense and security sector.

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

Addressing emerging security threats

he Maute group in tandem with the Abu Sayaff is a clear example of an emerging security threat. The Marawi siege, although it is near resolution, has caused a heavy loss of life, property, and the consequential loss in the economy of this part of the country.

The main distinction with the other previous security threats in the South is the avowed objective. The emerging threat draws its inspiration and direction from the ISIS and the intention of establishing an Islamic caliphate in Asia. There is therefore, a distinct possibility that there can be a spill-over or a replication of this type of fighting in other areas.

The increasing attacks by NPA elements against town centers and business activity in the country sides is another emerging threat. Those actions are motivated by the objective of showing strength to bolster their position in the negotiations and to show to victims of their revolutionary taxation that they can still wreak havoc if they don't come across. These depredations are indications that there is no central command authority and that they are not willing to lose their income and organizational support. To address this, the police organization has to be strengthened with mobile forces to react to such eventualities and CAFGU can be organized in areas to assist law enforcement or protect both the people and business operations in the hinterlands.

On the other hand, the archipelagic configuration and the latitude where our country is situated make it prone and vulnerable to two major catastrophes- killer earthquakes and super typhoons because of climate change. Lying in the Pacific Ring of Fire marked by volcanoes and faults, the country has been constantly experiencing earthquakes, the strongest and most destructive of which was the one that struck Bohol in 2013.

A study and simulation by JICA shows that a movement of the Valley Fault can trigger a major earthquake, the magnitude of which can affect Metro Manila with great devastation. Further, if the climate change resulting from excessive carbon emission in the environment is not arrested, more damaging super typhoons

and storms are expected to come. The Yolanda experience tells us how huge and massive the damages and losses in terms of lives and property will be incurred when extreme weather disturbances wreak havoc.

Cognizant of the destructive consequences of these manmade and natural hazards, the national government which includes the military, police, or other government civilian agencies should remain vigilant and well-prepared for these eventualities. Coping with these challenges requires a lean and mean organization of competent and mission-oriented personnel who are properly trained and equipped with leaders with proper deeply-ingrained values and attributes for good governance.

Instead of the AFP upsizing by recruiting more troops, the Ready Reserve Force should be activated and trained to have the minimum level of proficiency. It is best if a trained reserve force in an area is made available for activation anytime especially when AFP regular units are deployed or reassigned to more critical areas which are besieged by strong threat forces. Equipping them with the proper arms, equipment and necessary logistics makes them more capable to take over from the regulars. Furthermore, the local executive officials can be commissioned into the reserve force, to provide leadership for the reserve force.


For natural disasters, the AFP troops have proven to be reliable partners in search, rescue, relief and rehabilitation operations. It is imperative that the AFP Disaster Response Task Force be ever ready and fully prepared for the eventualities. In coordination with civilian agencies, capability-building and continuous training of civilian volunteers on search, rescue and relief operations should be continuously undertaken to act as force multipliers in natural calamities. The ready reserves should take this function as a primary competency.

The reemerging security threats and the natural hazards mandate that we reassess the manner we have been addressing them. It is time to undertake contingency planning to a new level so the organization, training and equipage be made more responsive to the requirements.

Defeating old and emerging threats

t really depends on one's perspective! It may be defined from the point of view of religion, social status, vocation, education and, maybe, the "issue of the day." I state this in relation to the individual or organisational position on what an "emerging threat" is all about. As what has been said, "...one man's hero, is another man's villain...." Stated in another way, what is deemed important to some, may be unimportant to others. However, from whatever pointof-view, it can be agreed that all types of threats impact society in a very essential way (just look at how stringent the security measures applied in aviation have become, even in malls).

My mistah, who is the director of the PNP Anti-Cybercrime Group (ACG), is very strong in his assertion that the focus of the time must be on Cyber-Crimes and Cyber-Terrorism. The numbers certainly support him (with the estimated 3,000 percent increase in Cybercrimes worldwide). The narratives supplant his argument. We read about manipulations of the internet to affect daily news (read: fake news), attacks on airport systems which have caused the disruptions in the regularity of air plane flights and even the theft of personal data from supposedly "secure" sites. The local scene has had its share of these attacks with the "temporary" hi-jacking of the COMELEC website, as a prime example. Therefore, my mistah may be justified in his position.

On the other hand, another mistah who is gallantly battling the MAUTE-ISIS elements in Marawi, feels that all the armed components of government must focus on addressing this particular concern. The damage that the ISIS has done in Mosul and Marawi is put forward as evidence. The particularly cruel manner by which the ISIS has treated human lives in the course of their campaign is certainly alarming. The manner by which they have gone out of their way to destroy records and artefacts of human civilisation and human history must certainly be seriously studied. The

video footages and other images from Marawi speak of long-term damage, not to mention expensive ones, to the infrastructure and the psyche of the inhabitants therein.

But, then again, many, and this includes the President himself, feel that more than anything else, the whole of government must be applied to defeating the tentacles and evils of the illegal drugs trade. It is asserted that their machinery and apparatus must be destroyed, and, with extreme prejudice. That the country was actually on the verge of becoming a "narco-state" and that "narco-politics" was becoming a dominant factor in governance, is certainly not being debated. It is accepted as a fact. Hence, this particular focus can also be justified. The syndicates involved and who are benefitting from the illegal drugs trade, as of latest reports, are even financing efforts to unseat the President in an attempt to stop the hemorrhaging of their losses; or their total bankruptcy.

Again, depending on one's perspective, and in acknowledgement of the reality that there are many and varied threats urgent upon our country and society, the need for a more concerted and comprehensive effort to address such threats is imperative. Government, or specifically its instruments, cannot be the only answer or the only one to be made answerable to the prevailing situation. It would take a citizenry, concerned and capacitated, to address the ills, whether obtaining or emerging, of the Filipino society. This is not to mention the fact that many of these threats have international "flavor" in them, and would therefore need an active synergy and lots of cooperation with the international community.

May the PMAer be in the middle of all efforts to address these pressing and emerging threats facing all of us that have the potential to derail more developments benefiting the generation of our children and all those who shall come after us.

Confronting cadet recruitment challenges

he recruitment of would-be cadets is of strategic importance to the future of the Academy. Since 2009, the Academy's recruitment data is unreliable despite the numerous efforts conducted to reach out to the best and the brightest among the youth to apply for cadetship. This may be the result of several significant factors such as PMA's lack of an institutionalized recruitment plan, intense competition among tertiary schools, the implementation of the K-12 program, and the deteriorating patriotism among the young generation.

It is noteworthy to mention that when the K-12 program started in 2012, the Academy did not have a viable plan and was definitely not ready for the new program's consequences on recruitment. The Academy's failure to anticipate the program's effects on recruitment consequently resulted to the tremendous decline in the number of entrance exam applicants. Although there were recruitment activities conducted, these were never institutionalized and did not necessarily aim to achieve a sustainable increase in recruitment. There was also a lack of consensus on the articulation of institutional identity and the value of institutional marketing. Limited resources and funding for the recruitment program for the past years resulted to the decentralized approach to communications and marketing that weakened the overall effectiveness of the PMA program. Recruitment efforts were designed and implemented only on a short term basis, notably, only in the weeks before the conduct of the PMA Entrance Examination (PMAEE). These efforts were deemed lacking in intention to build long-term outcomes and relationships with aspirants, parents, the media, and the community, in general.

For one, the implementation of the K-12 program contributed to the dwindling number of PMAEE applicants for the past years. Although this year, the PMAEE registered an increase of almost 6,000 applicants from the first batch of graduating students under the k-12 program who took the exam, the number of examinees for succeeding years are

expected to decrease. This year, President Rodrigo Duterte signed into law the Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act, a law providing free tuition for students of some 112 State Universities and Colleges (SUCS) in the country.

Considered as the biggest reform of the current administration, the law was welcomed with both approval and opposition. Positively, the law will increase the chance for more students to seek higher education. However, it is also perceived to kick start an exodus of students from private colleges and universities to state-run ones, which could ultimately affect the overall quality of tertiary education. The law will not only affect private colleges and universities. Even state-owned tertiary schools, the Academy included, will be on the verge of losing students and cadet applicants.

Historically, PMA is one of the practical avenues to a debt-free education for a vast majority of young men and women who come from poor or average-income families. PMA has undoubtedly provided cadets with more benefits and incentives than the full scholars of any state university or college. With the new law, students are now given more choices to finish college with lesser or no expenses at all. The free college education will essentially diminish PMA's market value and significantly hinder its recruitment efforts.

Although the Academy has safely positioned itself on sturdy grounds in terms of what it can offer to students, that is, earning an income while finishing a free college education, the law equally poses a bigger challenge for the Academy to improve its recruitment efforts. The Academy has to look into other means of attracting young men and women into joining the military. This means the adoption of challenging alternatives that will provide PMA not just with quantity, but with quality applicants who are welldeserving for cadetship and eventually, the chance to serve the country.

What's happening to our country?

"General, what's happening to our country?" These were the painful words uttered by the late former Vice President Emmanuel Pelaez directed at the then Quezon City Police Chief General Tomas Karingal as he was being wheeled to the operating room of St. Luke's Hospital. He was ambushed by unknown assailants near his home in Quezon City on 21 July 1982, a crime that resonated world-wide and featured in the 22 July 1982 issue of the New York Times.

That was more than 35 years ago when the country was already confronting the longest lasting Communist insurgency and a Muslim secessionist movement on top of criminality, and other law enforcement problems. Will the Philippines lick its peace and order problems and move up to a higher economic rung, like its neighbors in the region who had more problems? It is doubtful, as dire events in the immediate past and the present portend a bleak future, not only in the defense and security arena.

The fighting in Marawi City which rages even up to this writing, and before this, the massacre of PNP troopers in Mamasapano, Cotabato , the siege of Zamboanga City and many other encounters in ARMM areas, resulted in unacceptable casualties on the part of government forces and innocent civilians. This is not to mention the destruction of properties, dislocation of communities and heavy damage to the economy. One question that comes to mind is, how come the secessionist forces have so much manpower, modern and heavy weapons, almost limitless ammunition and combat support. They even have uniforms, flags, camps and sophisticated communication equipment that can hack high security tactical radios.

To defense and security analysts, the answer is no longer a mystery. It has been theorized and even known for a long time. It is the peace process that has strengthened the enemy. Because of the desire of government to attain lasting peace and show its sincerity, it suspended offensive operations; it even gave them



sanctuaries and territories into which government forces could not enter without coordination. Even the CPP/NPA insurgents have benefitted from the peace process. Their leaders in the past were released from jail and later rejoined them in the mountains. They too have become stronger, but unlike the localized secessionist insurgents, they could launch guerilla attacks in many parts of the country and control inaccessible hinterlands.

The war on criminality, particularly the anti-drug campaign, organized crime, and even the almost daily petty killings on the street, have likewise elicited increasing fear among peace-loving Filipinos. For one, these have reduced their trust and confidence on law enforcement units, notwithstanding the fact that a large number of the population, particularly the masses, continue to manifest support of the government's effort to fight these ills.

But beyond these dramas on the local stages of the country where the defense and security sector plays lead roles are realities in which problems are hidden in the interplay of democratic principles and processes. Alarmingly, there is too much intensity in the political arena, resulting, for instance in the use (or abuse) of the impeachment process. Will this result in some forms of political instability? Consider further, the following "what ifs".

- 1. What if the branches of government take different sides, jointly against one or individually against each other and create polarization of forces which will lead to a constitutional crisis? (Example: The executive, alone or in tandem with Congress defies the Supreme Court).
- 2. What if the Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL) is passed by Congress and the Supreme Court rules it unconstitutional?
- 3. What if the Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL) is not passed and the MILF and MNLF return to the mountains and renew their fight against government?
- 4. What if the CPP/NPA takes advantage of a chaotic situation and intensifies the pursuit of its political objective of replacing the democratic government by a communist state?
- 5. What if, the armed forces intervene, convinced that the situation requires them to do so to protect the people and the integrity of the state?
- 6. What if the Chinese intrusions in the Western Philippine Sea move closer to the shores of the country?
- 7. What if, a revolutionary government is declared?

Sad days ahead, indeed! If alive, the late Vice President would say what's going to happen to our country, instead of what's happening to our country. Let's pray that when that part of the future comes, the armed forces shall remain true to their sworn duties. 🏰



Scholarship funds to support PETFI scholars

he PMAAA Educational Foundation, Inc. (PETFI), formerly called the PMAAA Educational Trust Fund, Inc., was established in 1976 to raise and administer funds for the education of the children of deceased and disabled alumni of the Academy, from the elementary all the way to college.

To help raise funds for the Foundation, the PETFI board of trustees came up with the idea of establishing scholarship funds, to be funded from donations of well-off alumni and friends of the PMA, to be named after the donor or his designee, eg, Pres Ferdinand E Marcos Scholarship Fund, and the scholar-awardee to be called the Pres Ferdinand E Marcos Scholar. The donated fund is not spent but is invested with its earnings used to support the stipend of the scholar.

The scholarship fund supports the special scholarship of PETFI scholars in college. The yearly stipend rates are P30,000.00 for scholars with GWA of less than 85%, P33,000.00 for those whose GWA is 85% and above but below 90%, P36,000.00 for those with GWA of 90% and above but below 95%, and P40,000.00 for those with GWA of 95% and above. The increasing stipend rates is to encourage the scholars to aspire for academic excellence. .

The PETFI scholars in the elementary and high school levels are supported from other funds of the Foundation. The yearly stipend rates are P18,000.00 for the elementary and P20,000.00 for high school.

The PMA and the Foundation wish to extend to the scholarship fund donors their sincere thanks and appreciation for their generous support for the education of the less fortunate children of our deceased and disabled alumni who are regular members of our Foundation.

By the way, the Foundation was registered with the BIR as a tax-exempt donee institution, such that any and all donations to it are fully tax deductible by the donors.

THE QUEST FOR A NEW NDA

(Or should it be a National Security Law?) by Cay Fredelino S Bautista '66

Editor's note. This is a reprint of the same article published in the March-April 2011 issue of the Cavalier Magazine.

Introduction:

There is now another round of deliberate efforts to craft a new National Defense Act to replace Commonwealth Act Nr. 1 also known as National Defense Act (NDA) of 1935. It is widely recognized that this old law is passé for it fails or is inadequate to address current security realities in the local setting and international milieu where the country is an active player, although a second stringer, so to speak.

It also defies reason why since July 4, 1946 when the US granted the Philippines political independence (with due respect to the declaration of independence in Kawit Cavite in June 12, 1898), the NDA of 1935, an American crafted legislation designed to confront the imminent war against Japan at that time, has not been replaced. Nothwithstanding this fact, the country managed to breeze through its security problems and obligations - the communist and secessionist insurgencies, its international commitments as a member of UN and similar organizations and current threats worldwide like terrorism, illegal drugs and other transnational crimes.

Previous Attempts:

True, there were proposed legislations in 2004 and earlier, notably those filed by Senators Jinggoy Estrada, (1) and now Congressman Rodolfo Biazon (2). But they never made second base, thanks to the brand of democracy and political system existing in the country. In part, this is perhaps due to the strong anti-military attitude that has persisted in Philippine society and the fear of another martial law, an attitude that has sadly found foothold in Congress with the presence of left-leaning members.

A later attempt was the DND - AFP NDA proposal in 2007 which was even strongly endorsed to Congress by former President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo and the top leadership of the Defense Department and AFP. Its drawback, and maybe one reason for its failure to be enacted, was that the draft bill was too lengthy and detailed, containing 205 articles and 40 pages (3). Curiously its long title was "An Act to Establish Reforms in DND and AFP, Restating, Amending and Repealing For The Purpose Certain Laws, Appropriating Funds Therefore, And For Other Purposes." For Congress at that time to enact it into a law within its span of three years would be a feat. (Presumably, both houses of the Legislature had more important business in their agenda, plus the fact that much time was devoted to the conduct of their more challenging and rewarding function of investigation in aid of legislation).

Stop Gaps: Piecemeal Amendments And Issuances:

To cover the gaps arising from the old law, many provisions of which no longer applied to existing conditions then, numerous amendments were later introduced, first by succeeding Commonwealth Acts and later by Republic Acts passed by the newly- independent country. From the footnotes and explanatory notes in the pages of the NDA of 1935, the reader can count 12 commonwealth acts and eight republic acts which effected amendments, including outright repeal of certain sections of the NDA and other existing laws. Up to September 21, 1977 alone (martial law era), 21 more Republic Acts and 15 Presidential Decrees were added to the list of amendments (4).

Even up to the present, piece meal legislation and other issuances are issued - laws, executive orders, administrative orders, circulars, directives and policies. Their conformity with the NDA of 1935 may not be sufficiently justified, or worse they may not stand the test if brought under legal scrutiny and question. For instance, can the present AFP structure, mission and organization, rank distribution, defense mandate and policies, international defense and security engagements and reserve force provisions among others, find basis from the old law which provided for a war – time organization and which did not foresee internal problems that would necessitate the employment of the AFP?

These issues then create the urgent need to integrate into one law all the stop – gap measures to fit them inside the framework of defense and security, both of which have been enlarged by current realities in the country and the global community.

Defense and Security: Two Different Meanings:

Certainly, they overlap. They may even be viewed as two sides of the same coin. However, there is now a better appreciation of the fact that there are finer points that distinguish them from one other. Nowhere are these distinctions more pronounced and discussed than in fora of students/ graduates of defense and war colleges and security planners/ practitioners. (Hence, the value of defense-level education for military officers earmarked for high command and staff functions who are expected to interact with other stakeholders of national security, in a language peculiar to this enlarged field.)

Security is broader in scope and defense is only one of its dimensions. It is usually seen in a traditional sense with the military as main pillar, an erroneous view which has reinforced anti - military sentiments. Explained simplistically, national security is like a building, the over-arching architecture, and the military component is only one of the load bearing structures, the others being the socio - economic, political and cultural dimensions (and their derivatives).

The National Security Council (NSC), has a more encompassing paradigm on the interplay of national defense and security. The NSC framework identifies the national security sector, the threats in the various environments (domestic, regional, international), the government strategies, national security elements and national interests (5).

With a better understanding of the salient points of national defense and national security, lawmakers shall be better guided on what type of law is needed that will address security issues today and in the years to come, in the long term and in whatever scenario (6). All eyes will be focused on the primary stakeholders and the lawmakers. Expectedly, the process will be long and tedious, even emotional and passionate. Recall how heated the public debates and discussions were in connection with the ID system, reproductive health and anti – terrorism, the last one ending in the passage of Human Rights Law, a far cry from the primary intent of combating terrorism.

Which Shall it Be, Then?

A National Defense Act?

A National Security Act?

Or a National Defense and Security Act?

Bills now in Congress reflect the different biases on the kind of law proposed to replace the NDA of 1935. At the House is House Bill Nr. 865. National Defense and Security Act of 2010 filed by Congressman Rodolfo G. Biazon and Senate Bill Nr. 110 sponsored by Sen. Gregorio Honasan II. On the part of the DND - AFP, they proposed a National Defense Act of 2010, which is a modification of their National Defense Act of 2007.

Although the DND - AFP version has sections briefly stating declaration of principles lifted from the Constitution and national defense policies involving the civilian population, there are no provisions relating to or defining the broad picture of national security, national interests and objectives and how the dynamics of national defense will fit into the socio – economic, political and cultural dimensions of national security. Therefore, the proposed legislation appears isolated from the other components of the security sector. It is a pure national defense law in the same vein as the NDA of 1935.

On the other hand, the Biazon and Honasan Bills have conceptual/ theoretical convergence, in the sense that both include substantive provisions on national security. Both have definition of terms pertaining to national interests and objectives. The two bills also clearly identify the civilian components of the security sector and their roles, particularly the National Security Council, and Department of Foreign Affairs. Although it includes provisions on the DND and the AFP, the Honasan proposal is largely a national security law rather than one about national defense. What is also noticeable in his bill is that the various dimensions of national security, i.e, political, economic, socio - cultural and techno scientific are recognized and discussed (7).

Senator Honasan for sure, is not the only public official or private citizen who sees the need for a national security law to replace the NDA of 1935. Father Romeo J. Intengan S.J President of the Center for Strategic Studies way back in 2005 calls for the strengthening of the AFP through a new National Security Act. He argues that the notion of defense and security at the time the NDA of 1935 was enacted was defined in purely military terms and oriented toward preparation against an external invasion. He believes among others that a national security act will provide a more comprehensive definition of national security (8).

Contentious Issues

There is truth in the contention that the security concerns of our country are not complex, compared to those which have global interests, like the U.S. Therefore, a combined defense and security act is seen as preferable and manageable. On the other hand, the case of the Philippines is unique and therefore the new law must be geared to the conditions in the country - the existence of Muslim secessionist movement and the communist insurgency (among the few, if not the only one remaining in the world.) and terrorism (which according to many critics will not be effectively addressed by the Human Security Act).

But whatever form is enacted, it must address certain contentious issues that will certainly provoke heated debates between traditionalists (the old school) on one side and the "realists" (for lack of a more appropriate term) on the other hand. The latter are those who advocate a drastic change in the law to conform with new scenarios, like revolution in military affairs, asymmetric warfare and operations other than war, all of which call for the participation of the civilian sector.

The foremost contentious issue is whether the SND will be in the chain of command the way the military defines it. The SND is the alter ego of the Commander – in – Chief. He is in the line of authority but merely exercises supervision and control of the AFP. The Chief of Staff, AFP, in contrast, commands the AFP, both in an administrative and operational sense. His most important command function is the employment of forces in all types operation, something the SND cannot do on his own terms. There were instances in the past when there were conflicts between the CSAFP and the SND on the matter of authority over some purely military matters. This will happen again if both individuals have direct access to the President outside the purview of Chain of Command or Line of Authority.

Second, which is related to the first issue, is whether or not the CSAFP is a commander or the Chief of the Joint Staff at DND, similar to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff at the US Department of Defense. A commander gives commands and directives on his own authority; a staff officer advises the commander and supervises implementation of directives. Yet, the present most senior officer of the AFP is called "Chief of Staff", a misnomer in military doctrines. If it is intended that the CSAFP will command the AFP, then he should also be called the Commander, AFP. The problem here is that this title is contrary to the Constitution. The title Chief of Staff is a carryover of the provisions in the NDA of 35. The new law must therefore define the role of the highest officer of the AFP. If the primary function of the CSAFP is Chief, the Joint Staff, DND and $\,$ not Commander, AFP and the SND is in the chain of command, this will be a set – up where civilian authority over the military is truly a reality. Certainly, ambitious officers aspiring for the highest military command will not be happy. The questions is, will it be better for the AFP? Will it prevent military intervention? Will it be better for democracy?

Third is the call to active duty of ready reserve units, not individual reservists, through partial mobilization, for limited employment in Internal Security Operations (ISO). There seems to be hesitation on the part of the AFP to call to active duty reserve units (not CAFGUS although they are also reserve units) and be given ISO missions. The objection is that it will violate the Constitution, since it involves mobilization which must be approved by the President and Congress during times of emergency.

PMA conducts entrance exam in Aklai

ne hundred sixty-seven male and female applicants took the Cadet Qualifying Test(CQT) of the Philippine Military Academy last August 20, 2017 at Northwestern Visayan Colleges in Kalibo, Aklan. According to Major Maristella Dela Paz of PMA Class 2005 and the OIC of the Proctor Team, there was a significant increase in the number of applicants compared to last year when only 68 examinees took the examination The increase in number of candidates was attributed to the information campaign targeting high school graduates with the advice that K-12 students may now take the examination. The information drive and review for the examination was conducted from July-August 2017 by Dr. Chris Rebano Francisco of PMA Class of 1968 in more than a dozen high schools in Kalibo and neighboring towns with the help of social media. The information campaign was disseminated throughout the province by the Department of Education(Dep Ed). This was the first time that the Dep Ed participated in the information drive for the PMA entrance examination which turned out to be successful in attracting more applicants. Dr. Ernesto F. Servillon, PhD, MNSA is the Aklan Dep Ed

School Division Superintendent who issued the memorandum for the School Division to assist PMA in the dissemination of information pertaining to the entrance examination. This year, a total of 15,000 applicants took the CQT compared to last year's 10,000 examinees in 40 test centers nation-wide, usually given yearly every third Sunday of August.

According to Cavalier Chris Francisco, there is a need to intensify the information campaign about the PMA in the rural areas . This will afford the rural youth from poor families to take advantage of the PMA free four-year Bachelor of Science degree and a commission as 2nd lieutenant or ensign in the Armed Forces of the Philippines after graduation.

Editor's Note: The information campaign and review classes for cadet applicants are effective ways of attracting more young men to take the PMA entrance examination. These are also being done in Cagayan by alumni from the province.

If I have to give TITOY another distinction, I would call him the "Survivor Officer" of the Class which he voluntarily assumed perhaps as his apostolate. 



Museum). The date was moved from Dec 3 to Dec 9 due to non -availability of the venue.



General Castro served as a member of the US-Philippine Mutual Defense Board and the US Military Base Philippine Negotiation Team, witnessing the events that led to the closure of the US bases in the Philippines. He would later serve as the Philippine Defense Attaché to the United States in Washington DC. He also served as the Commandant of the AFP Command and Staff College prior to his retirement in the early 1990s. He passed away on 5 September 2017 and is survived by his wife of 54 years, Priscilla, daughters Margaret and Theresa, son Arturo Castro Jr. (wife Lizette), grandchildren Christopher, Sophie, and Nathan.
