

A purview of lessons Sharing with others, learning from each other

s the whole country witnessed another historic milestone in the country with the assumption of a new administration on 30 June 2016, the Philippine Military Academy for its part etched in its history the meaningful experience of hosting an international conference.

In the previous issue of the Cavalier Magazine, I proudly shared with you the three institutional thrusts from which all our plans are anchored. It was also in that same issue that I briefly talked about the hosting of the 6th Rimland Pacific Superintendents' Conference (RPSC) held last 18-22 July 2016. It was a gathering of heads and key officials of Service Academies from Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Russia, Singapore, South Korea, Thailand, United States, Vietnam, and the Philippines.

This year's RPSC became more relevant and timely for all participating Service Academies as we explored the ways and means by which the academies can aggressively integrate the challenges of global security in the curriculum. These institutions, like the PMA, are entrusted with the great task of educating leaders. It is important for them to correctly perceive and appreciate their roles in addressing the future of this world, especially in the maintenance of peace and amity in the Pacific Region.

During the conference, the participants agreed that it is through cooperation and collaboration of the Service Academies that they could address and better understand the dynamic and complex issues of regional and global security issues. Working together compensates for weaknesses in international relations. Working together means the exploration of a number of worthwhile undertakings like joint opportunities advocated by the RPSC, such as semester exchanges, professional training exchanges, short duration orientation visits and faculty/staff exchanges.

More importantly, I have picked up two very important lessons from the presentations of the Service Academies during the conference. First is how some academies establish and promote an all-encompassing faculty development program which is instituted at organizational level rather than as an individual initiative. In addition to the individuals' aspirations to improve, their organizational strategy of developing their faculty members presents a more strategic thrust in improving the qualification of their teaching force in the long-term. It is this lesson that motivated me well enough to consider pushing for a longterm faculty development program, which we have already launched, to enable PMA to keep up with a rapidly changing internal and external environment. This rational framework will assure our stakeholders that PMA will continue to provide quality education to the cadets through a highly qualified faculty.

Secondly, during the discussions, I was impressed by how some of the academies perceive and confront honor violations by their cadets. Some presentors posited that the cadets' response to the violation of the Honor System should be better viewed from a proactive rather than reactive perspective. To them, their Honor System, which encompasses the culture of ethics,

is all about making choices and rising up to the challenges of these choices. Cadets are given the choice and decision to adhere to core values, adopt prescribed morals, and act in accordance with ethical standards. This philosophy expects the individual to voluntarily accept his mistakes and make necessary reparation for any violation without outrightly being denied the chance to examine himself and start anew. This approach is preferred to developing a culture of ethics based on obeying rules in order to avoid punishment. Thus, the question, "Are we creating a just ethical climate where a corrective system instead of a retributive one is fostered?" has now become a complex challenge for us in the Academy and even our stakeholders.

There could be no better learning experience than listening to everyone shares information, exploring who opportunities for partnership, and arriving at new conclusions on varied topics of great interest to us. Indeed, there was so much to learn during the conference and in the days that passed so that we in the Philippine Military Academy, are challenged to make innovations. But more than the lessons learned, equally important to us is that this gathering has inculcated in us the value of partnership and cooperation and the meeting of different minds for a common end which the RPSC successfully accomplished. 鑷

Along one path toward common goals

Those who aver that they love their country and want lasting peace and security should now walk their talk. All they must do, if they are sincere: Follow the leader; obey the laws (this includes following traffic rules); drop those guns (those who want to rule outside the existing political system); be honest (especially those who are trusted with the people's money). Be disciplined and law-abiding, in short. And there are more...

We now have a new President and Commander-in-Chief, thanks to a widely participated, albeit hotly contested national elections last May. President Rodrigo R. Duterte may not be a majority President, but he got the highest number of votes with an overwhelming lead over the other candidates. Therefore, he is everybody's President, not only of those who supported and voted for him. That's democracy, in essence.

During his inaugural address last June 30, 2016, he said: *"I now ask everyone, and I mean everyone, to join me as we embark on this crusade for a better and brighter tomorrow."* What more could be a better first step for starting a governance that is backed-up by the governed?

For our cavaliers, in fact, all those in the uniformed service, active or retired, rallying behind a new Commander-in-Chief, has never been a problem. Aside from the fact that they respect the constitutional provision of civilian supremacy over the military, they never questioned the chain of command (except perhaps in a few isolated cases which became dark spots in the history of the armed services).

The coming months and early years of the new administration will be crucial to the future of the country. The flagship programs of the new government have been clearly spelled out – pursuit of the peace process, eradication of corruption, war against criminality in general and against illegal drugs in particular. The military and the other armed services have been assigned specific tasks, some of which are beyond the traditional boundaries of their primary functions. The success of the pursuit of peace with the insurgent and secessionist groups, (a political process and not the mandate of the military) places a great onus on the military. The civilian sector has the impression that the armed forces prefer that there shall be fighting in their hands – for a bigger force needing a big slice of the budget and promotion of their senior commanders. Those who had been or are still in the thick of the fighting know that this impression is farthest from the truth. It is never fun to be away from home, roaming the jungles and mountains, looking for battle with the enemy and in so doing risking their lives and limbs. Perhaps, the critics have not seen up close grieving widows and orphans during wakes and burials or even experienced the intense sorrow of those who lost a loved one at an early age.

The difficulty of serving in the armed services is perhaps one of the primary reasons why their retirement system, compared to the civilian sector (except the judiciary and independent commissions), is one of the best in the world, concept-wise, not in its monetary value. Unfortunately, the full pension arrears of those who have retired have not been given by the past administration. Nor have they been included in the appropriations for the current year. There is however light at the end of the tunnel with the promise of the new administration to address retirement benefits and increased pay and allowances of those in the active service.

But it is not the prospect of a higher pay and payment of pension arrears that inspire the alumni to rally behind the new leaders. It is their high sense of duty and love of country developed in the Academy through the years by the core values of courage, integrity and loyalty.

And lest the alumni shall forget, recall scenes at the Academy hallways when upperclassmen asked plebes: Why do you want to be a cadet. And they answered: To serve my country, sir!

Ten PETFI scholars graduate from college

en (10) scholars of the PMAAA Educational Foundation, Inc. (PETFI) have graduated from college at the end of school year 2015-16.

One of them, Margaret J Concha, graduated cum laude with a BS Psychology degree from St. Louis University in Baguio City. She is the daughter of the late Marvin M Concha '72 from the PNP.

There were seventy-one (71) scholars of PETFI during the past school year, from grade school to college. The scholars who are children or younger siblings of deceased or disabled regular members in good standing of the PMAAAI and regular members of PETFI.

The scholars are given a yearly stipend of P30,000 for those in college, P20,000 for those in high school and P18,000 for those in the elementary. Special scholars, those whose weighted general average during the preceding school year is at least 85%, are given a higher stipend as incentive, P33,000 for those with average of 85% to below 90%, P36,000 for those with average of 90% to below 95%, and P40,000 for those with average of 95% or above. Those who graduate with honors are also given incentive of P5,000 for cum laude, P10,000 for magna cum laude and P15,000 for summa cum laude. This is in addition to P5,000 for merely graduating within the prescribed duration of the course.

The PETFI was incorporated in 1965, the first among the four PMAAA affiliate foundations, as a vehicle to raise funds to support the education of the less fortunate children of deceased and disabled married alumni and younger siblings of those unmarried. It is a tax exempt donee institution. Presently, it has now a fund balance of P29 million.

The president of PETFI is Cav Jose C Lapus '65. 🎲



Inaugural address of President Rodrigo R Duterte

Malacañang Palace, 30 June 2016

President Fidel Ramos, *sir, salamat po sa tulong mo* (thank you for your help) making me President; President Joseph Ejercito Estrada; Senate President Franklin Drilon and the members of the Senate; Speaker Feliciano Belmonte and the members of the House of Representatives; Chief Justice Maria Lourdes Sereno and Associate Justices of the Supreme Court; His Excellency Guiseppe Pinto and the members of the Diplomatic Corps; incoming members of the Cabinet; fellow workers in government; my fellow countrymen.

No leader, however strong, can succeed at anything of national importance or significance unless he has the support and cooperation of the people he is tasked to lead and sworn to serve.

It is the people from whom democratic governments draw strength and this administration is no exception. That is why we have to listen to the murmurings of the people, feel their pulse, supply their needs and fortify their faith and trust in us whom they elected to public office.

There are many amongst us who advance the assessment that the problems that bedevil our country today which need to be addressed with urgency, are corruption, both in the high and low echelons of government, criminality in the streets, and the rampant sale of illegal drugs in all strata of Philippine society and the breakdown of law and order. True, but not absolutely so. For I see these ills as mere symptoms of a virulent social disease that creeps and cuts into the moral fiber of Philippine society. I sense a problem deeper and more serious than any of those mentioned or all of them put together. But of course, it is not to say that we will ignore them because they have to be stopped by all means that the law allows.

No leader, however strong, can succeed at anything of national importance or significance unless he has the support and cooperation of the people he is tasked to lead and sworn to serve.

Erosion of faith and trust in government – that is the real problem that confronts us. Resulting therefrom, I see the erosion of the people's trust in our country's leaders; the erosion of faith in our judicial system; the erosion of confidence in the capacity of our public servants to make the people's lives better, safer and healthier.

Indeed, ours is a problem that dampens the human spirit. But all is not lost.

I know that there are those who do not approve of my methods of fighting criminality, the sale and use of illegal drugs and corruption. They say that my methods are unorthodox and verge on the illegal. In response let me say this:

I have seen how corruption bled the government of funds, which were allocated for the use in uplifting the poor from the mire that they are in.

I have seen how illegal drugs destroyed individuals and ruined family relationships.

I have seen how criminality, by means all foul, snatched from the innocent and the unsuspecting, the years and years of

accumulated savings. Years of toil and then, suddenly, they are back to where they started.

Look at this from that perspective and tell me that I am wrong.

In this fight, I ask Congress and the Commission on Human Rights and all others who are similarly situated to allow us a level of governance that is consistent to our mandate. The fight will be relentless and it will be sustained.

As a lawyer and a former prosecutor, I know the limits of the power and authority of the president. I know what is legal and what is not.

I know that there are those who do not approve of my methods of fighting criminality. They say that my methods are unorthodox and verge on the illegal.

My adherence to due process and the rule of law is uncompromising.

You mind your work and I will mind mine.

"Malasakit. Tunay na Pagbabago. Tinud-anay nga Kausaban (Compassion. Real change.)" – these are words which catapulted me to the presidency. These slogans were conceptualized not for the sole purpose of securing the votes of the electorate. "Tinudanay nga kabag-uhan. Mao kana ang tumong sa atong panggobyerno (Real change. This is the direction of our government)."

A s I take on the responsibility of leading the 130,000-strong men and women of the Armed Forces of the Philippines, I will begin my journey by giving back all the praises and glory to our lord god almighty. I firmly believe that all momentous events, such as this, are designed by the author and finisher of our faith. We can only move forward to claim our destiny with Divine Grace and Providence.

join me just the same. Together, shoulder to shoulder, let us take the first wobbly steps in this quest.

There are two quotations from revered figures that shall serve as the foundation upon which this administration shall be built.

"The test of government is not whether we add more to the abundance of those who have much; it is whether we provide for those who have little." – Franklin Delano Roosevelt

And from (Abraham) Lincoln I draw this expression: "You cannot strengthen the weak by weakening the strong; You cannot help the poor by discouraging the rich; You cannot help the wage earner by pulling down the wage payer; You cannot further the brotherhood by inciting class hatred among men."

My economic and financial, political policies are contained in those quotations, though couched in general terms. Read between the lines. I need not go into specifics now. They shall be supplied to you in due time.

However, there are certain policies and specifics of which cannot wait for tomorrow to be announced.

Therefore, I direct all department secretaries and the heads of agencies to reduce requirements and the processing time of all applications, from the submission to the release. I order all department secretaries and heads of agencies to remove redundant requirements and compliance with one department or agency, shall be accepted as sufficient for all.

I order all department secretaries and heads of agencies to refrain from changing and bending the rules in government contracts, transactions and projects already approved and awaiting implementation. Changing the rules when the game is on-going is wrong.

I abhor secrecy and instead advocate transparency in all government contracts, projects and business transactions from submission of proposals to negotiation to perfection and finally, to consummation.

Do them and we will work together. Do not do them, we will part sooner than later.

married to the pensioner before his retirement. It also provides that a pensioner who renounces his Philippine citizenship by acquiring a foreign citizenship shall lose his pension. These provisions, which were very unpopular, were intended to save the government of what was considered unjustified retirement expense. Unfortunately, it took the AFP leadership twenty (20) years before implementing these provisions. Anyway, despite its delayed implementation, these provisions somehow have reduced the retirement pension requirement of the AFP.

2) Stoppage of the retirement in the next higher grade or rank and of the computation of the retirement pay based on the pay of the next higher rank than the permanent rank last held.

3) Non-inclusion of the longevity pay in the computation of retirement pay, such that the retirement pay shall be based only on the base pay.

4) Increase in the compulsory retirement age and/or length of service for officers, thereby shortening the period of their receiving retirement pension. One suggestion is to increase the compulsory retirement age of officers to 57, 58, 59 and 60 years for O-7, O-8, O-9 and O-10 officers, respectively.

Of course, we know that the above contemplated amendments of the retirement law (PD 1638) will be very unpopular and will certainly meet strong oppositionfrom those adversely affected, just like the proposed amendment of the law to stop the automatic adjustment in pension of retirees to the rates of their counterparts in the active service.

And for the record, I do not recommend, neither do I support, any of the above-mentioned amendments of PD 1638, as amended. The only reason I presented them here is to show that the automatic adjustment in pension is not the only culprit, that it is not the only provision of PD 1638 that has caused the huge military retirement pension requirement. What I do strongly recommend to the proper authorities is to favorably consider the suggestions discussed above, as follows:

1) Revive the Reserve Officers Rotation Law under RA 2334, repealing or amending Executive Order 79, as necessary;

 Revive the draftee system in filling up the soldier requirements of the AFP;

3) Adopt a highly selective reenlistment policy, limiting reenlistment only to those possessing technical and special skills needed by the AFP;

4) Adopt a policy of replacing military personnel performing administrative functions in headquarters and support units by civilian personnel; and

5) Amend RA 9188 by reducing the percentage of general/flag officers back to 0.75 percent of total officers strength.

Addressing the huge and increasing military retirement pension requirement

(Editor's note: This article which was published in the September-November 2013 issue of the Cavalier is reprinted in response to, and as a possible input into studies being made by the present administration to address increasing pension requirements of the armed services.)

t has been reported that the yearly military retirement pension requirement is now nearly equal the yearly pay and allowances of military personnel in the active service. And it has been projected that in a few more years the retirement pension requirement will surpass that of those in the active service.

This situation is being blamed on the provision of the AFP retirement law, PD 1638 as amended and before that RA 340, which mandates the automatic adjustment of the retirement pension to the rates of pay of military personnel in the active service. Whenever the pay of military personnel in the active service is increased, the retirement pay is correspondingly increased. Although in actual implementation, the adjustment is not automatic; it is subject to availability of funds, resulting in pension adjustment arrears, amounting to now P17.89 billion according to the AFP Pension and Gratuity Management Center (PGMC), whichshould not be the case.

The rationale of this provision of the retirement law is to maintain the purchasing power of the pension of those retired who had given the best years of their lives in the service of their country and people. Imagine if there is no adjustment, a retired colonel will continue to be receiving the less than P1,000.00 monthly pension he was receiving when he retired several decades ago.

Those trying to solve the problem would like to amend the AFP retirement law to remove the automatic adjustment in the retirement pay to the rates of pay of those in the active service, and in lieu thereof to provide a system of indexing the pension every five years, similar to that of the GSIS. This proposal has caused a lot of concern and anxiety among the retired military personnel. To allay their concern, I have advanced the opinion that if that proposed legislation would be passed by Congress it will not apply to those who are already retired and are enjoying the said benefit under the present law. A right or a benefit already being enjoyed pursuant to a provision of law cannot be withdrawn or terminated. The new law will apply only to those entering the military service after its effectivity.

In addressing the problem of the huge and increasing military retirement pension requirement, one must not look only on the automatic adjustment of the pension to the pay rates of the active military personnel. One must look also into why the number of those retiring, and the corresponding amount of retirement pension, has greatly increased over the years and how that can be reduced.

The AFP manpower program calls for a small regular force with a big reserve under what is referred to as a Citizen Army concept. The reserve force is to be continually trained by a small regular component as the cadre. RA 2334, the Reserve Officers Rotation Law, enacted in the early 60's, provides that reserve officers are to be called to active duty (CAD) for a period of six (6) months subject to extension of tour of active duty (ETAD) for a period not exceeding a total of two (2) years, after which they are to be reverted to inactive status, except only those possessing technical or special skills needed by the Armed Forces. The purpose of the rotation law is to afford as many reserve officers as possible the opportunity to undergo training and service, such that when there is mobilization in time of war or emergency, they are already trained and prepared for deployment. The other positive effect of this rotation law is that these reserve officers will not stay long in the service to enable them to retire and enjoy retirement pension. But what happened? In 1986, under the revolutionary government of then President Cory Aquino, she issued Executive Order No. 79, which has the effect of a law, providing that all reserve officers who had served a total of at least ten (10) years of active service shall be secured from reversion to inactive status. These officers are now like regular officers who continue to be in the active service until compulsory retirement. This has greatly contributed to the huge retirement pension requirement. To help solve the burgeoning retirement pension requirement, the AFP should strictly implement RA 2334, amending Executive Order No. 79, as necessary.

The number of general and flag officers in the AFP has greatly increased with the passage of RA 9188 which increased the percentage of general and flag officers from 0.75 to 1.125 percent of thetotalofficersstrength. As a result there are now more officers retiring as general or flag officers, thus increasing their retirement pension. The previous0.75% should be restored.

We should look also into the enlisted ranks. By AFP regulations, they are enlisted for a three (3) year term, subject to reenlistment upon the expiration of their term of enlistment (ETE). Reenlistment is not a matter of right on the part of the enlisted personnel. Enlistment and reenlistment is a contract of service, subject to mutual consent or approval of the enlisted person and the enlisting authority. But what is happening? Almost always, everybody is being reenlisted, with the exception only of those with pending cases, derogatory records and/or physically/medically unfit for continued service. So, they continue in the service until they retire. Again, this has contributed to the burgeoning retirement pension requirement.

In addition, there was a law that added two higher grades, Senior Master Sergeant (E-8) and Chief Master Sergeant (E-9), in the enlisted ranks, with corresponding higher pay rates, resulting in higher retirement pension.

To help solve the retirement pension problem, why does not the AFP re-adopt the draftee system whereby the enlisted manpower requirement is filled up with draftees who serve for a period of eighteen (18) months, the first six (6) months of which as trainees under RA 4091 and the last twelve (12) months as members of the operating units. They may be extended for an additional six (6) months for them to undergo skills training, similar to the training under TESDA, to qualify them for employment in the private sector.Since the draftees will not retire, the draftee system will greatly reduce the retirement pension requirement of the AFP. Another advantage of the draftee systemis that the fighting force is kept young, from 18 to 21 years of age, unlike the aging enlisted ranks, and being still unmarried the draftees would not be bothered in the performance of their duties by family problems.

We should also consider replacing military personnel performing administrative duties in headquarters and support units with civilian personnel, thereby reducing correspondingly the total military personnel strength. Some functions like providing security in military camps can be contracted to security agencies that will provide security guards. (This scheme reportedly is being considered by the PNP.)

Those who wish to stop the automatic adjustment of the retirement pension to the rates of pay of those in the active service to solve the huge pension fund requirement may wish to also look into other possible amendments of PD 1638, as amended, to attain their objective, such as the following:

1) Stoppage of the transfer of pension upon the death of the retireepensioner to his surviving spouse and/or unmarried minor children. It is this transfer that lengthens the duration of the receiptof pension.

PD 1638 has a provision along this line,thatlimits the scope of a surviving spouse to be entitled to transfer of pension to one who was Continued on page 11




Top two photos (Birthday of Ding Wenceslao); bottom photo (Signing of Golden Sword contract)

These included the Karay-a Rice Tradition Revisited, Kinaray-a English Dictionary and Thinking Aloud.


Again, naturally, meeting with Adel and Nick would lead to anecdotes not yet known to the entire Class such as that of



CAV SERAFIN P AGUIRRE '51 10 November 1927 – 5 July 2016 Last rank held: Col PA

Eulogy by Col Gregorio R Vigilar USMA '53



am honored and privileged to be asked to say a few words about Col Serafin P Aguirre who throughout his adult life rendered dedicated and truly outstanding service

to our country and people. While I have not worked continuously with Apin, but I can appreciate his true character after associating closely with him on three different occasions, namely, when he was my upperclassman at PMA in 1948-49, when we served together with the 2nd BCT (PEFTOK) under the United Nations Command in Korea in 1954, and when we studied as AFP pensionados at the University of the Philippines in 1957 – 1959.

When I was a plebe at PMA, we classified our upperclassmen as either "terrible" (those who usually inflict on plebes endless push-ups, pull-ups, sit-ups, foot-locker exercises and other physical and mental miseries), or "kind" (those who did not go beyond simply "bracing" plebes). We classified Apin as "kind". One of his classmates later confided to us that Apin, while he was a plebe, suffered so much from the Assistant Tactical Officers who served as their upperclassmen, that he vowed to refrain from imposing the same miseries on plebes when he became their upperclassmen.

During our plebe year, our room at the Camp Allen barracks was next to

Apin's. The room partitions were not the floor-to-ceiling type and thus enabled upperclassmen to stand on the upper bunks and look into the next door plebe rooms. I recall that during our evening study periods (1915 - 2145 hrs), Apin would peek into our room and usually catch us dozing over our books. A cadet who did not stay awake during the entire study period, would invariably be "deficient" during the next day's classes. Apin wanted to ensure that his neighbor plebes did not go deficient. He had an effective remedy to keep us awake. He would order us to get our dirtiest pair of socks, place these on our study table. The aroma would keep us awake and, consequently, help to keep our grades proficient. This was one instance where Apin showed that he was more concerned that his plebes successfully graduate, than with making them miserable.

I lost touch with Apin when I left for West Point in 1949. We worked together again when we trained at Marikorea in 1953-54, in preparation for duty in Korea. Immediately before this, Apin served in Sulu in the campaign against Kamlon. For the information of those of you who were born only after the early 1950's, Kamlon was a notorious Muslim rebel who, operating with a wide mass base in Sulu, engaged the AFP in a protracted, costly and bloody campaign for several years. Apin was already a seasoned combat veteran, even before we went to Korea.

In 1957-1959, Apin and I were roommates while we studied as AFP pensionados at the UP College of Engineering. Apin worked on completing the requirements for a BSc in Mechanical Engineering, while I studied Civil Engineering. Apin, with his laid back character and the disciplined ways he developed while he was a cadet, was an ideal student roommate.

JULY - AUGUST 2016

We boarded at the cottage of the late Dr. Mateo Tupas, who, at that time, was the head of the UP Geology Department, and who mentioned to us that he had two boarders who had twice failed in Calculus. He was concerned that if they failed the third time, they would be expelled from UP. He asked us if we could help to keep these boys from being expelled from UP. Apin volunteered to tutor them on the condition that they agree to exercise discipline in their studies, similar to that required of cadets at PMA. Firstly, he prohibited them from going out during week day nights and, instead, work on their class assignments. Throughout the entire semester, Apin went over each day's lesson with them for, at least, two hours every evening. For about a week at first, the two boys chafed under Apin's disciplinary rules, but Apin quietly but firmly told them that they either toe the line or look for another tutor, and thus risk being ejected from UP.

Gradually, the two boys accepted Apin's rules, studied their lessons assiduously, and discovered that Calculus was not that difficult if one had a competent and sympathetic instructor, and if they relentlessly kept their noses to the grindstone. They passed the semester with good grades, and proudly bragged to their classmates that they conquered the subject only after applying PMA discipline to their studies.

Considering Apin's good looks, it was not surprising that several UP coeds developed a "crush" for Apin. I recalled that they would ask me to introduce them to Apin. When I asked them why Apin when I was available, they told me that I did not have Apin's dreamy eyes.

The foregoing notwithstanding, Apin was one of the last two members of the Class of 1951 to get married. There was a contest between Apin and Mateo "Vangie" Evangelista as to who would be able to hold out longest as a bachelor. But then, Apin met Myrna and forgot all about the contest. This was the start of a blessed and fruitful marriage which had survived all these years.

Apin taught at PMA and, later, served with the staff of the National Defense College of the Philippines (NDCP). In all his assignments, Apin served with a quiet effectiveness and unremitting dedication that made him a highly valuable man to have around.

he man who lies in state before us is the late Col Nolan Rolando Jardiel Laput of the AFP and a member of PMA "Matindi" Class of 1963. Nolan lived a full life – entering the

PMA at 18 years old, and retiring from the military service at the age of 56. While in the service, he lived through many combat operations against Muslim secessionists in the south and NPA rebels nationwide. It was just unimaginable that he would choose to leave us through an unfortunate vehicular accident, now that he had safely retired at the healthy age of 76!

But then, that was Nolan; he was always unpredictable and full of surprises, to the point of delightful eccentricity. From the Sword of 1963, he was aptly described as follows and I quote: "Nolan is a man who has his own side of any issue. Things done in a different way is Nolan in action. If he had his way, he will change the whole world. A rebel in his own way, Nolan is one who cannot be disturbed when at work." Unquote.

Unlike the other speakers before me who had the chance to work with Nolan while in the service or at some other instances, I, on the other hand, did not have the opportunity to interact with him up close. After graduation from PMA, he went to the Army, while I joined the Marines. While in the Academy, I could only brag that since we were both tall and handsome, we qualified to join Delta Company, the company where the taller and better looking cadets were normally assigned. We were in the same company from plebehood to graduation.

No one really understood Nolan that well. When we were cadets and even now that we are retired, Nolan would always come in late for any occasion or any class gathering. He would be late, but never would he be absent. That is why we are bewildered why this time, he chose to go ahead of us to the great beyond!

Joking aside, what we are definitely sure of is that inspite of his secretive nature, deep within him, he sincerely loved his family so well.

As President, I would like to express the collective grief of all the members of our class over the untimely demise of Nolan and offer our profound sympathy and condolences to Naty and the children, Noel, Noemi, Noreen and Nelson and the rest of the family. Please be consoled with the thought that your Nolan is now at peace with the Lord in heaven.

Ol Nolan J Laput PA was my first bunkmate and squadmate in the Academy. For the next four years, we were in the same platoon of Delta Company. As a cadet, Nolan had his own way of solving problems. Inspite of the odds, he made it successfully. Among others, we mastered the technique of being in the parade formation at the last second of "Attention Call."

Upon graduation, we separated ways. He joined the Army and I went to the Air Force. Obviously, our military career paths never crossed. I found out he was trained as tank commander and preferred field assignments. During the secessionist movement in Mindanao, I was always with the CSAFP and party of General Romeo Espino. I met him once at the final offensive operations in Lebak, Cotabato as he was one of the Battalion Commanders.

I take this occasion to inform the relatives and friends of Nolan that our families became closer through time. Our wives, Naty and Luz were both graduates of UP PGH School of Nursing. Since traffic was not a problem then, we were neighbors. The Laputs were at Ideal Subdivision while the Espejos were billeted at University of the Philippines. It was so easy for the two families to be together on special occasions.

Naty and Luz decided to take their Nursing Masters' Course at Philippine Women's University. It was an evening class and in many occasions, Nolan and I would be at the parking lot waiting for the two to be dismissed from class. It was a sacrifice for the two families. It did not take long. Both families had twins!

In the early nineties, a new twist in our family lives occurred. Naty and Luz decided to work in America. Nolan and I became single parents and we handled the immigration documents as our children wanted very much to stay in America. Sometimes, Nolan and I would meet each other in Atlanta, Georgia.

Then it was time to retire and settle in the Philippines. The usual family get together became less frequent as Nolan was involved in a religious group. In some of the PMA Class 1963 reunions, Nolan and I agreed that these "apostolic duties" did not retire us from work.

Nolan, mistah it is time to say goodbye. PMA Class 1963 will always miss and remember you whenever roll calls are undertaken. I know you sacrificed a lot in rendering service to the AFP and to our country. I know Naty, your children, grandchildren, relatives and friends will be consoled as you make your final journey to the Lord Almighty. My final salute to you and may you rest in peace.
