


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
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ABOUT THE COVER

FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S DESK

Leadership Excellence

As I turn-over the mantle of leadership to the incoming Board, I wish to share the following guide-posts entitled LEADERSHIP DOZEN. In all its form and substance, it is the trademark of every cavalier — LEADERSHIP EXCELLENCE. This singular factor has sustained the strength and stability of PMAAAI.

1. Craft Your Vision

The bread and butter of leadership is direction. Leaders do not limit themselves to measuring and ensuring their team's performance; rather, they ensure that this performance is directed towards a right and worthwhile end. The root of this direction is a clear, concise, and relatable vision that captures what the organization aspires to be. It is the fundamental job of the leader to craft and sell this vision to their team, to make them believe in the power of the vision.

2. Build a Strong Team

Leaders are not - and cannot - do everything. They humble themselves and realize that they are not experts everywhere. Rather, they tap into the skills of their people and bring them together to form a team greater than the sum of each individual. A team of diverse skills that complement each other will outperform any single person or even many uncoordinated people.

3. Inspire

There is a huge difference between mere compliance and earnest commitment. Compliance comes from fear of penalty while commitment comes from conviction in the task and the organization. The latter can only come from inspiration. Leaders know that inspired members act out of their passion and create better results out of their own initiative.

4. Communicate

Leaders are conscious of the power of words. They know that their team values their words and that the right words at the right time can make all the difference. But they also know that before they speak, they must listen. They listen intently to the praises and complaints of their team and act upon them decisively.

5. Be an Optimist

A culture and atmosphere of negativity and doubt can destroy even the most well-prepared and intentioned of plans. Yet, this culture only reflects the attitude of the people and their leaders. Thus, leaders should set the example of an optimistic and determined can-do attitude, even in the face of seemingly insurmountable obstacles. This optimism and determination is not detached from the harsh reality on the ground. Rather, the leaders take on their fair share of their time in the trenches and use that time to show their concern and inspire their men.

6. Maintain the Momentum

The leader's work has only just begun once the vision is set and the team starts rolling. Excellent performance and motivation are not givens; rather, they are maintained through continuous effort. The foundation of this are clear standards of performance and behavior. Ultimately, people will keep repeating whatever is rewarded. Thus, leaders are keen to watch for good performance and reward it accordingly.

7. Build Strong Alliances and Networks

Leaders understand that no matter how good their team is, much can still be gained from allying with like-minded groups and individuals. Far from viewing similar groups as threats, they see them as an opportunity to learn and grow. Moreover, leaders know that even just one strategic alliance can open up a new world of opportunities and create a shortcut to success. They think long-term, knowing that strong relationships and agreements are not made overnight.

8. Be Prudent and Judicious in the Use of Resources

Leaders are aware of the fact that they cannot be everywhere at the same time. One of the most precious resources leaders have is their time. No matter how hard they try, they cannot possibly do everything themselves and nor should they. Rather, leaders should focus their time on doing the most impactful things they can and trust the rest to their followers through delegation. Resources include physical and human resources.

9. Be Stable Under Pressure and Learn Continuously

It is in the most trying times when people look up the most to the leader. Unfortunately, this is also when the leader is under the most pressure to act in the midst of great uncertainty. What can help leader is a level head focusing on their desired outcome rather than the negative emotions. This mindset looks at the problem and asks what needs to be done to solve it rather than focusing on the clouded judgement of stress.

10. Be a Risk Taker

Leaders are often tasked with changing their team for the better or even guiding teams and organizations through changing times. Any change for the better comes with an accompanying risk, yet the risk must be taken for things to change for the better. Thus, leaders must accept a certain degree of risk as an occupational hazard.

11. Develop a Culture of Professionalism

Although often unspoken and routinary, culture plays a key role in deciding the performance of a team. Leaders understand this and seek to create a culture that brings out the best in people and naturally pushes them to do their best. However, leaders also know that this culture begins with themselves. They strive to set an example through their words and deeds by saying the right things and doing the right things.

12. Follow Through

No matter how well a leader has done their job, their time will eventually end. There will be time for another to step in their shoes and man the helm of the team. Good leaders acknowledge this and cast their ego aside for the betterment of the organization. They let go of their position at the right time, leaving behind a positive legacy and acknowledging the good they did.

Cavalier Awardees and Other Outstanding Alumni, AY 2018-19

he Board of Directors of the PMA Alumni Association, Inc. (PMAAAI) has selected as Cavalier Awardees for AY 2018-2019 eleven alumni who, after a stringent nomination and selection process, have been found to have the most outstanding performance in their respective fields. The Board has also selected nine other alumni to receive the Outstanding Achievement Award. They have brought honor not only to themselves but also to our Association. Besides exemplifying the Academy's motto of integrity, courage and loyalty, they have distinguished themselves among equally competent and devoted alumni-achievers. The awardees, who merit our snappy salute and highest praises, are the following:

A. CAVALIER AWARD

For Public Administration:

Cavalier Fernando L Mesa '75, Mayor, Municipality of Alabat is on his 2nd term as Local Chief Executive of this 5th class municipality, one of the three towns comprising Alabat Island in Quezon Province. Guided by his vision of a Mapayapa, Maunlad, Maganda at Masayang Bayan ng Diyos and Mission, "langat ang antas ng pamumuhay ng bawat pamilya," he



crafted and implemented programs that addressed challenges in health, education, value formation, livelihood and peace and order.

Innovative and hardworking, Cav Mesa steered this rural municipality into a vibrant community, making Alabat an exception among far-flung and island municipalities because of its low incidence of poverty, below national levels. The municipality is free of corruption, drugs, and rabies. It has the lowest malnutrition in Quezon Province. Alabat produces organic coco sugar in its processing center - the first operational, PCA-funded coco hub facility in the country. Traditional copra making employs one farmer earning P1500 per hectare. However, a one-hectare farm producing coco sugar in Alabat employs six sap gatherers each earning, on average, P10,000 per month, and three cooks earning P9,000 each per month. With this initiative coconut farmers can now earn above poverty threshold. Cav Mesa has always been invited in several forums

to relate what he has been doing to improve the quality of life of his constituents.

For Private Enterprise:

Cavalier LOUIE C TICMAN '76 is multifaceted. He rose to simultaneously become an accomplished be-medalled Officer, and out-of-the-box PNP Reform Champion (until 2010 retirement); successful entrepreneur and respected business executive; environment advocate and distinguished Rotary



Leader (Charter President, 1993-94; Governor, 2013-14); and staunch follower and servant of God.

He founded a small meat company in 1984 which he expanded and diversified over time, transforming it into a modest conglomerate. He is currently Chairman and CEO of Rublou Group of Companies with businesses in:

- Meat and Agri: Hog Farms; Fruits and Vegetable Farms; Slaughterhouses (National Champion; Regional Hall of Fame Awardee); Meat Wholesale and Retail (Rublou "Fresh is Best" brand)
- **Real Estate Development and Leasing:** Mixed-use Properties; Community Malls; FoodMarts, etc.
- Renewable Energy and Utilities: Solar Power Plants;
 Waste-To-Energy; Waste-water Treatment and Recovery

For Special Field: Technology (Cybersecurity):

Cavalier JESUS V LOMEDA JR '80 is chosen unanimously to receive the Cavalier Award for Special Field of Technology (Cybersecurity). He is instrumental in the leadership and development of cybersecurity in the country, to include internationally. He



has advised the Secretary of Defense to recognize cyberspace as the 5th dimension of warfare and to prepare for it; and proposed that cyberspace be included in the sovereignty clause of the new National Defense Act and Constitution. Cavalier Lomeda has been motivating the members of Signal Corps to be in the forefront of cyber warfare by improving their technical

skills. He was very influential in the activation the AFP Cyber Group and regularization of the Army Signal Regiment. He was the Co-Chair of the ASEAN Defense Ministries Meeting Plus (ADMM+) Experts Working Group (EWG) for Cybersecurity, which is composed of 10 ASEAN countries and eight super powers. He is presently the VP for Cybersecurity of 5G Security Inc. (Formerly G4S) and the CISO of PT&T.

For Command and Administration:

Cavalier OSCAR D ALBAYALDE '86 is one leader who believes that every PNP personnel plays an essential part in the security and law and order system with the help and partnership of the community. He encourages police officers by assuring them that when they work as a team, no task is too daunting to be successfully accomplished. He has proven this countless times with the success of the tasks and programs he has implemented.



As Metro Manila's Top Cop, PDG ALBAYALDE strictly implemented practical programs for crime prevention and suppression, an intensified campaign against criminality and illegal drugs, and a sustained internal cleansing of NCRPO's ranks which proved to be an answer to the worsening crime situation in Metro Manila. This was validated by the results of a Pulse Asia Survey which showed that 81% of respondents from Metro Manila agreed that they felt safer because of the campaign against criminality. Moreover, Metro Manila experienced a drastic decrease in its crime volume barely six months after his designation as the Regional Director of NCRPO.

As PNP Chief, he focused his leadership on achieving a truly disciplined organization while implementing a massive internal cleansing program anchored on firm discipline and respect for oneself and the public. Last June 24, 2018, PDG ALBAYALDE took the lead in a fundraising event for children with cancer at the Philippine General Hospital dubbed as "Chief Oca Rides Against Cancer," from Clark, Pampanga to Luneta Park, Manila.

In the race against time to save lives, he personally supervised and utilized all PNP assets (land, air, water) of the entire PRO 2 and adjacent police regional offices for disaster search, rescue and recovery operations during the onslaught of Typhoon Ompong last September 16, 2018 where massive landslides occurred at Itogon, Benguet.

Last November 5, 2018, he led the PNP Internal Cleansing Faith Assembly at Camp Crame with different religious, spiritual partners and stakeholders of the PNP to help direct police personnel towards the straight and narrow path of public service and inspire them to always serve with dignity, integrity, and honor.

A total of 58 awards and decorations bear witness to his outstanding performance in his assignments, including a Gold Cross Medal, a PNP Outstanding Achievement Award, and three PNP Heroism Medals, among others.

Truly, PDG ALBAYALDE is an epitome of a police officer who embodies the essence of the word excellence. Despite the recognition, he remains humble, always ascribing his success to the grace of God.

For Police Operations:

The police career of Cavalier GUILLERMO LORENZO T ELEAZAR '87 turned fast and furious upon his appointment as Director of the PNP Anti Cybercrime Group (ACG) in January 2016. It was imperative for the PNP to establish its police power over the medium of the future. Cav Eleazar provided this unit the impact it needed to make its presence felt in the Social Media



In July 2016, Cav Eleazar was appointed District Director of the Quezon City Police District (QCPD). He pushed a relentless drive against illegal drugs and other forms of criminality in Quezon City, getting big criminal groups along the way. By late 2017, QCPD was chosen as the Most Trusted Police District per Napolcom surveys.

In April 2018, Cav Eleazar took over the helm of Police Regional Office CALABARZON (PRO4A), where he immediately made his mark.

Just barely two months at PRO4A, Cav Eleazar was transferred and promoted to NCRPO as its Regional Director.

Working with dispatch and precision, the NCRPO immediately won awards in the PNP Anniversary – one for being the best region in the war against illegal drugs, another as best region in internal cleansing.

With Cav Eleazar as part of Team NCRPO since July 2016, the region experienced a 54% index crime reduction for the first 30 months of this administration (Jul 2016 - Dec 2018) versus the last 30 months of the previous administration (Jan 2014 - Jun 2016); and 21% crime drop in 2018 from 2017.

Just seven months into his stint at NCRPO, Cav Eleazar was named "Man of the Year", by DZRH, the oldest and largest radio network in the country with an overwhelming 61% of votes cast.

This February 2019, Cav Eleazar will also be feted by the Metrobank Foundation in its annual Awards for Continuing Excellence in Service (ACES), a prestigious tradition of citing outstanding police personnel for their exemplary and noble work in crime prevention and crime solution.

For Alumni Affairs:

Cavalier LEO ANGELO DIEL LEUTERIO

'88 has shown exemplary dedication to the promotion of the welfare of the PMA Alumni. This is manifested in his enthusiastic and serious commitment and involvement to activities and organizations which, for their purpose and goals, relate to the betterment of the well-being of PMA Cavaliers and their dependents. He has unselfishly dedicated his personal time, efforts,



talents and resources for all of these, even for the improvement and enhancement of systems relevant to Alumni activities. His enthusiasm to involve himself in the work done or being done by his own class, his PNP service chapter, the four (4)

Philippine Military Academy Alumni Association Incorporated (PMAAAI) Foundations, the PMAAAI Mother board and other instrumentalities for the upliftment of the image of the individual cavalier and alma mater, is a matter of record. He has been an officer of the PMA Maringal Class of 1988 as Chairman and as a member of its Board of Directors since its inception. He has been an officer and member of the Board of the Police Cavaliers Association Incorporated (PCAI); and contributes his share to the important work of the organization. He is a lifetime member and a Trustee of PMAAAI Foundations, meaningfully contributing his own effort to raise awareness and funds of these foundations. He was a member of several PMAAAI Boards and served as its President and Chief Operating Officer (COO) in 2016-2017. He also has done his share in contributing inputs to the Cavalier Magazine, as a contributor, an associate editor, a senior editorial assistant and a member of the Editorial Board. As a frequent visitor to the PMAAAI Center, he has humbly helped in improving the facilities and the over-all appearance of the "Home of the Cavaliers" located in Camp Emilio Aguinaldo. Cavalier LEUTERIO has shown the spirit and the brotherhood expected of a PMA Cavalier in looking after the welfare and benefit of other cavaliers.

For Coast Guard Operations:

Cavalier RONNIE GIL L GAVAN '93 helped create the enabling environment to end the lingering issue of piracy in the Basilan Strait by leading the inter-agency team who successfully facilitated the surrender of Patha Salapudin and Imbuh Misuari, the sub-leaders of the most active ASG-affiliate KFR group while helping facilitate the revival of maritime trade in a maritime region to reverse



social dissent which drove a maritime people to maritime violence entrepreneurship. He is one of the planners who conceptualized the highy sensitive and extensive maritime operations plan during Pope's visit in Manila and "OPLAN APEC 2015" which became the showcase of cooperation and interoperability amongst the maritime agencies in the country.

He authored the Organized National Engagement (ONE) a Sea concept that helped inform the "White to White" national security policy. Similarly, he provided the framework for the maritime security component of foreign support to the PCG including as an interlocutor for US cooperation on the formation of the National Coast Watch System and in the bilateral negotiations for the establishment of the Joint Coast Guard Committee (JCGC) with China.

A visionary with a heart, he conceptualized and promoted the concept of PEACE for Protocols on Engagement At-Sea for Coastguards and Enforces, aimed to preserve the unique attributes of coastguards in the promotion of regional and global peace.

For Army Operations:

Cavalier RAMON P FLORES '94 has faithfully lived-up to the PMA motto of Courage, Integrity and Loyalty. He has an honorable and unblemished record and a reputation beyond reproach and brought honor and prestige to the PMA.

All throughout his military career, he exemplified the high level of competence both in combat and administrative assignments. What set him apart is his proven track record of excellence in combat operations and field assignment. Cav Flores has the distinction of the only Battalion Commander who has been given the



responsibility of leading and commanding two (2) battalions in two major AFP campaigns for a span of two years. The campaign against the Abu Sayyaf Group in Sulu as Commanding Officer of 32nd Infantry (DAREDEVIL) Battalion, 1ID, PA and in the Liberation of Marawi City as Commanding Officer of 63rd Infantry (INNOVATOR) Battalion, 8ID, PA. His sterling leadership in the 32nd Infantry Battalion resulted in major decisive encounters with the ASG and for these feats, President Benigno Aquino awarded his unit with the Presidential Unit Streamer Award in 2016. Cav Flores' combat exploit and superb leadership contributed significantly in the liberation of Marawi City. He was critically wounded while leading his unit in a fierce firefight while extricating troops in the last enemy stronghold in Building 1010. For this feat, he was awarded by President Rodrigo Duterte the Order of LapuLapu (Kampilan).

For Air Operations:

Cavalier ROLANDO CONRAD B PEÑA III '97 is the Director for Operations 5th Fighter Wing. Through excellent performance characterized by his diligence and commitment to his role, Cav Peña is constantly on-the-go to spearhead the conduct of air support and strike missions against High Value Targets (HVTs).



As the P-A-F gears towards underlining its relevance in providing peace and security to the motherland, Cav Peña, before his designation as the No.3 in the 5th FW hierarchy, was instrumental in various missions flown in order to achieve this purpose. As a seasoned Flight Lead of the FA-50PH Fighting Eagle, he has flown more than 2,000 hours of jet time in different sorties which include a majority of the night strikes and surgical air strike missions against HVTs in Butig, Lanao Del Sur; Cotabato, Basilan, and Maguindanao areas. Mostly as the Pilot-in-Command (PIC), directly involved in Air Operations, he had flown a total of 125 combat sorties and dropped a total of 250 MK-82s (500-pounder bombs) equal to 125,000 pounds of lethal force during the Marawi Siege - a remarkable record that will forever be etched in the annals of the war-fighting history of the Fighters — thus, earning him two Gold Cross Medals, the Distinguished Aviation Cross, and the PAF Officer of the Year CY-2018.

For Naval Operations:

Cavalier GILBERT G VILLAREAL JR '98 is currently the Commanding Officer of SEAL UNIT of the Naval Special Operation Group. His assignments include four years in the

Navy ship as Surface Warfare officer; 13 years as Naval Special Warfare officer in several units of NAVSOG; and as Intelligence and Security Officer in the Navy and to other key personalities in the AFP/DND/PSG.

He is a recipient of various awards: three Gold Cross Medals; three Navy Cross Medals; Gawad sa Kaunlaran Medal; seven Bronze Cross Medals; ten Military Merit Medals; several Military



Commendation Medals; and the Distinguished Conduct Star – the 2nd highest award in the AFP which he received for his gallantry in action during the intense campaign againts the Abu Sayaf Group on November 2001.

In the most recent historic military campaign dubbed as the Marawi Crisis, he was designated as the Commanding Officer of Naval Task Unit-Marawi. Cav Villareal played a crucial role in securing Lake Lanao which made a great impact on the overall success of the military operations against the local terrorists group that eventually led to the declaration of the Liberation of Marawi City by no less than the President and Commander-in-Chief Rodrigo Roa Duterte on 17 October 2017.

Cav Villareal being a SpecOps, security, intelligence and EOD practitioner is a graduate of PMA Class 1998. He holds a Masters Degree in Defense Analysis for Irregular Warfare and Special Operations from the Naval Post-Graduate School in Monterey California. He has also published several articles to include his thesis on his Masteral Program entitled "Operation Exodus: The Massacre of 44 Philippine Police Commandos in Mamasapano Clash."

For Special Operations:

Cavalier HAROLD L NEMEÑO PA, a member of PMA Class 1999, is an accomplished Army Special Operations Sniper and Commander of a 16-man Sniper Task Group of a Special Missions Unit of the Philippine Army. During the height of terrorism incidents in Western Mindanao Command AOR in 2017, he personally led his Sniper Task Group in non-stop interdiction operations against the enemies of the state, leading from the front, setting the example, sharing the same risks and inspiring his men. These actions of LTC Nemeño resulted to the following:

- A. Eighty-seven (87) confirmed sniper kills, all validated;
- B. Recovery of 21 high-powered firearms from the enemy;
- C. Recorded the longest confirmed night-time sniper kill shots in AFP history from 1,116m to 1,165m, with five (5) confirmed kills, all validated;
- D. Inflicted confirmed sniper kills against seven fully-armed enemy high-value Individuals, all validated;
 - E. Decisively ended major conflicts; and
- F. His 16-man Sniper Task Group suffered only one wounded-in-action while inflicting an astonishing number of heavy casualties against the enemy.

The Golden Jubilarians: PMA CLASS 1969



We Graduated and Moved, Armed with Traditions

arch 25, 1969 was our big day. Imbued with straight forwardness, the wisdom of the generals and the sensible rules of Emily Post and George Bernard Shaw, we stepped into the real world full of contrivances of seniors and wise professors to keep mediocrity at a distance, a world inhabited by people so different from where we trained that we would so gently ask ourselves:

Will I practice too much civility in an environment full of strange mortals who could make life sweeter or bitter?

But the call of the field, the call of audacity, regardless of adversity and the promise of faster promotion was too much to bear. Since the PC was the flavor of the times, spiced with on-thespot promotions if an NPA Commander was captured, almost half of the class (20) were assigned to the PC, 16 to the Army and seven to the Navy. Six of the PC Officers went to the Philippine Air Force for flying training with the arrangement that their branches of service will be changed to PAF upon completion. Ironically, Max Balansay, who was a cadet of the PAF Flying School before joining the PMA, joined the PC, and many years later, continued his flying training in the constabulary flying unit, but fatally crashed and became one of the class first casualties. Cris Abanes, who was assigned to the Army, joined the PAF flyboys but was torn between flying training and an AIM scholarship, and he chose the latter. Dan Reventar was with the troop carriers, Benjie Defensor joined the new air commando squadron as fighting started in Southern Philippines, Nonoy Carranza become a flight instructor, Smokey Cariňo went to the fighters, then migrated to New York while Lito Labao flew the U-17s but met misfortune during a flight near Baler Bay and was never recovered.

Similarly, the same fate was suffered much later by Rimbert Gonzales of the Navy, who went missing in the sea on a flight back to Manila. Jake Duller migrated to the US and found his pot of gold in LA and mastered the lessons of California Dreaming while finetuning his expertise with new technologies.

As expected the brand new PC and the Army Officers blazed the trail for brilliant conduct and marked services. In various assignments they showed merit and ability and the unique skill of getting things going.

The PC show was led by the irrepressible Luzon assigned budding stars, and, not in any order: Rene Aguda, Rey Berroya, Ferdie Lagman, Tom Lantion, Larry Mendoza, Rudy Garcia, Vic Tiangco, Ed Mendigo, Cris Villanueva and Ike Begonia. Most transitioned from Company COs to Provincial Cmdr or Metrodiscom Chief and some like Rey and Larry became Regional Directors or Task Force heads. Ike was provincial commander in La Union and then Benguet before finally succumbing to the lure of the diplomatic service. Rudy headed the CIDG and Larry rose to become PNP Chief and later, DOTC and Executive Secretary. In Larry's future assignments, he brought with him Tom, who became LTFRB Chief, and Rey Berroya, who headed the LTO. The Visayan top boards included silent-worker Romy Sua, Mon Martinez, who made an impression in West Visayas and Jess Almaden who was winning all the awards in Central Visayas before he was transferred to Central Mindanao where he displayed his charming and handsome side, and got married there. Rene Aguda later moved to Southwestern Mindanao where he got his recommendations for a star.

The Army team, not wanting to be left behind, took on the insurgents in the South and engaged them in Central Mindanao



(Flor Toribio, Greg Camiling, Kayong Ariola and Damy Yala) while the rest of Mindanao became the stage of Vic Erfe, Alex Noble and later, Jimmy De Los Santos. In various assignments in Luzon were Bingbo Brilliantes, Pol Gange, Nick Garcia and the DND boys. Dennis Nagtalon was a major ahead of the rest.

In the Navy, Willy Wong completed his tours of sea duty; Jus Manlongat joined ISAFP and became one of the most informed with the stories and secrets of the AFP in the years that covered the active service of the class. Cleo Erfe and Jess Regala had various base assignments but later on were selected to serve in the Office of the President in Malacaňang. Boy Maligalig had assignments in the AFP and DND but had to pause to complete his schoolings. Cutes Bacungan reinvented geographic assignments by claiming that Cebu was the center of the universe because he did not want to leave the province and Manila was mere field assignment.

However, for a class to be credible, it should not only have meritorious achievements in the field but also a complimentary record in the academe. The class exhibited it had a lot of brain power when many topped advanced and other schoolings, the General Staff Courses and the NDCP masters. The top graduates included Jimmy Delos Santos, Ferdie Lagman, Boy Maligalig, Rey Berroya, Rene Aguda, Nonoy Carranza and Willy Wong. Those who finished their Command and Staff courses abroad like Greg Camiling and Benjie Defensor were inducted into the Hall of Fame of their respective universities in the United States for outstanding performance.

THE DIPLOMATIC CORPS OF CADETS OF 69

Foreign Service careers sometimes start after service in another the military or other profession. But since it was martial law, the ironclad rules of diplomacy give way to other priorities and the realities of the moments: gov't had to stay ahead of events by anticipating political movements, locally and abroad. The military attaches were around but the administration needed something more than just intelligence — trust, loyalty and the ability to anticipate events using a realist approach.

Thus, even though diplomacy and military science do not always substitute for the other, selected military officers were assigned to various posts and this included 69ers: Ed Mendigo was very valuable at the Philippine Consulate General in New York, then in San Francisco, as Tom Lantion was in the Philippine Consulate General in Los Angeles and Joey Syjuco of PMA and West Point 69, the rising star of the class, was assigned as Philippine Consul General in Seattle and London, and Deputy Chief of Mission in Washington DC and London.

Ike Begonia, the only member of the class who developed into a true-blue career diplomat, was assigned as Consul at the Philippine Consulate General in San Francisco, and as the Philippine Consul General in Manado, Indonesia and in Guangzhou, China, before becoming Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary

in the State of Qatar, Romania, Republic of Bulgaria and Moldova, representing the government of the Philippines. He developed his diplomatic skills so well, he can say yes to a proponent, even if he means no and the other guy goes home feeling happy, successful and even loved.

Willy Wong, after his retirement as Phil. Navy FOIC, became Ambassador to Vietnam, a profession he could have joined earlier with his idealism, abilities and communicative skills. In Vietnam, he delivered and polished his tennis, making him one of the favorites of the diplomatic community there.

Benjie Defensor was designated Phil Ambassador at large to Chair the Asia-Pacific Economic Corporation (APEC), Anti-Terrorism Committee where he was named Best Performer by the 21 member states because of the record number of initiatives he was able to get consensus for, with a concept called warrior/karaoke diplomacy. At the meeting of the Heads of State, he offered to resign his position for upstaging the Philippine President in an international forum, but as expected, it was refused with a smile and praise.

Jimmy de los Santos proved to the world that the Filipino soldier equaled world standards. He bested other candidates from the ASEAN region in a highly competitive selection in process conducted by the United Nations. That paved the way for his appointment as Force Commander of 24-nation UN Peacekeeping Force in East Timor. He performed creditably well and restored peace, security and stability in war-ravaged country. After retirement he got involved in the academe serving as President, UP Alumni Association, member, UP Board of Regent and Professorial Lecturer (part-time). He was Director of Graduate Studies, Manuel L Quezon University.

Karl Kraus (1936) once asked: "How is the world ruled and led to war?" Answer: ask the diplomats of Class 69. They have plenty of warriors and leaders in their class.

In 1980s, the Dept. of Defense was a nest of comradeship of different classes and commissions, and was in fact, a center for coordination and information of many groups, including Class 69. It was indirectly, a cohesion machine, making the department stronger and more efficient than other agencies. Percentage-wise, Class 69 had one of the highest numbers in the Dept. as initially, they included Mon Martinez, Boy Maligalig, Nick Garcia, Kayong Ariola, Danny Yala, and Vic Erfe – a veritable think-tank and center of information with the latest updates on events of the country. They, together with many others, developed a natural breeding ground for reformists and in fact, attracted several others to make reform a catchword in the months to follow. The RAM was slowly gaining ground and since most of the key speakers were DND-based, leadership centers sprouted. Added to this were the information campaigns conducted by the DND Peace and Order Council which moved all over the country with various messages like the clean election campaign of Oplan "Kamalayan".

The participants and volunteers were in a sense, a big military family, and supporters grew, until they would look more and more

like a band of brothers, willing to help and fight for each other. When German Field Marshall Von Hindenberg popularized the band of brothers concept, he was thinking of a life and death situation, where under the strains of combat, brothers fight to help the buddy next to him and never let him down. Being part of the band gives confidence, warmth and courage to the members, but few realize that among Peemayers, some classes strongly feel and pronounce they are closer than brothers. Wittingly or unwittingly, the RAM used the idea of brothers to the maximum, such that recruitment became easy as events would show.

Of the PMA classes recruited in this period, Class 69 was one of those in a state of close observation as it had personalities perceived to be genuine and strong commanders. Among them were: Rey Berroya with his reputation and credibility in Central Luzon, Larry Mendoza with his natural leadership qualities, Alex Noble, the Baguio wunderkind, who invaded the south, and Boy Maligalig who combines intellect with courage to confront a major anxiety of the time. Benjie who came from schooling was approached by the RAM boys to be their editor. Thus, major decision-makers and observers then and now, view with great concern, Class 69 as a class of leaders who can easily generate loyal forces and cannot be taken lightly.

An emotional highlight of EDSA 1 was when "PMA, O Hail to Thee," was played unexpectedly on the renegade Radio Bandido during the critical hours of the uprising. Accounts revealed that Peemayers on both sides were stilled by the music, became tearyeyed and some even stood at attention. The anchor June Keithly, asked permission to play the flip side of the recording but was not allowed, fortunately. The other side was "My Kaydet Girl" and June was advised it could cause romantic dancing in the streets. Radio Bandido, operated by Class 69, was DZRJ, owned by Ramon Jacinto, who later on, performed back to back in concerts with the class' band, The Sounds of 69.

After EDSA1, unauthorized military movements followed in 1987 and considered the bloodiest, the 1989 uprising. The 69ers were involved, and one of the most dramatic moments was when Boy Maligalig who was with Commo Calajate '61 at Logcom, attempted to take over GHQ with a handful of men but was met by a battalion of soldiers and had to move back on brotherly advise of a mistah, Damy Yala, who was Chief of the AFP Operations Center. Realizing a bigger common danger, ordered: "Mistah, Talo ka na. Time to run!" Bullets were flying, but with Damy's instinct to think selflessly and because of combat experience, there was something comforting or even charming in the sounds. The rebels lost but they gained a victory of sorts. The uprising debunked the myth that military camps had to move out of Manila because the troops

came from the bases and camps inside the Capital City. The troops came from outside Manila so the politicians had to invent another reason to sell the military camps, the proceeds of which could not be accounted for.

After the 1989 uprising, Alex Noble and Vic Erfe moved to Mindanao with their men and continued their struggle. Alex, a poet and literary buff, idolized Ralph Waldo Emerson who once said about life, "The more experiments you make, the better. What if you do fail, and

get fairly rolled in the dirt once or twice. Up again, you shall never be so afraid of a tumble."

Fast forward now to 12 years later. EDSA 2, the condensed version of EDSA 1, unfolded. But the two EDSAs are worlds apart. They are similar only in name. No reformists, no secret meetings, no unauthorized military movements, only back-stage considerations of the five highest ranking military officers, which included three 69ers. With the safety of civilians a major concern. EDSA 2 came to pass.

On Center Stage: The Sounds of 69

Class 69's departure from AFP/PNP centerstage did not mean curtain call for them. Prior to Benjie's stepping down as CS,AFP, the class reinvented itself as the "Sounds of 69 at the Officer's Club in Camp Aguinaldo. It turned out that the class not only produced some of the country's best, if not brightest men in the military and the police, but also nurtured concert artists.

The group was conceived in 2001 at the Villamor Golf Clubhouse. The founding members were the Commanders of the military and the police. They were PAF CG and later, AFP Chief Benjie Defensor, PA Chief Jimmy delos Santos and PNP Chief Larry Mendoza and West Pointer Joey Syjuco. The class deemed it fitting to start a musical journey since the following year, many members were retiring from the service. The affair was also a perfect time to honor a class that scored a feat in both the military and police services despite being one of the smallest in number since World War II. Initial front-liners included Benjie, Jimmy, Larry and FOIC, Willy Wong and Greg Camiling Jr. who became Vice CS, AFP and later on Army Chief. Jus Manlongat and Cris Abanes joined the starting line-up with Vic Tiangco and a resurrected Pol Gange as managers.

So really, how goooood is the Sounds of 69? The class, known to labor hard in any pursuit because they perform to excel, displayed very well this trait in their musical adventure. Perhaps, the only group of generals in the whole world to form themselves into a band, gifted with music, their best description came from a foreign officer: "There are great singers in the military service, but why did the Sounds of 69 sing in our time? They make others nervous." The group usually starts off with Believe in Music, slides into World Without Love, and paces up to Monday, Monday. Jimmy de los Santos pumps up the audience with his Happy Together number. After several performances and concerts, the Sounds of 69 is now at a point where the pleasure in the techniques of music gradually reached a straight and level plane, and in a few moments of inspired solitude and proficient harmony, the 69ers have become the

instruments of the songs they have selected. This is the reason why they have developed "singlemalt" smoothness with phrases like "Music is Love, love is music if you know what I mean. People in music are the happiest people I've ever seen."

Younger officers commented that the Sounds of 69 definitely deserves a bigger encore and bookings around the country. Their final call: "We've now seen how retired generals should behave or sound. Believe it or not." Take a bow.

The Journey Untold... 25 years at its Finest

ARMY GROUP - THE GUARDIANS OF THE LAND

t is not the destination that counts, but it is the collective stories in every chapter of their journey that matters to the 114 free-spirited Army individuals who found themselves marching out of the hollowed ground of the Philippine Military Academy on that blissful day of 6th March 1994.

Remarkable as it was, the Journey of the Army Group of PMA "Bantay Laya" Class of 1994 can be best articulated in four important chapters: Training to Serve and Honing the Spirit; Cutting-Edge of the Army; Learning the Rudiments of the Jungles called Headquarters; and finally, Leading the Front...

Chapter 1 - Training to Serve and Honing the Spirit. The Army Group was the

recipient of the new Army Pre-Deployment Training which has the following courses: Scout Ranger Orientation Course (SRTC, FSRR, PA); Officer Basic Course (TRACOM, PA); Special Operations Team Training (CMOS, Psyops, PA); Marksmanship Training (AMTU, PA); and, Basic Airborne Course (SFG-A).

Upon reporting to Headquarters Philippine Army in April of 1994, the group was warmly welcomed by the Scout Rangers in a simple but memorable reception "in the lubloban" that saw many of the group members wanting to join the rangers, thus, the warrior spirit and the challenge to live-up to ethos of Skill, Stamina and Spirit came into being. The physical and rigorous training made the class bond together.

Immediately after SROC, Training Command, Philippine Army located at Fort Bonifacio took over the training program. The Officer Basic Course (OBC) offered a respite in the rigors of SROC. The AFPOS phase divided the class into Infantry, Armor, Artillery, Signal and Engineers where majority of the Army Group joined the Infantry Officer Basic Course.

The theoretical phase of the SOT was conducted in Fort Ramon Magsaysay, Palayan City. The group had its first experience of being deployed in the field during the conduct of SOT practical exercise in the different municipalities of Western Pangasinan. This experience thought the group one important lesson that will guide them while in the army, service beyond the call of duty.

The year-long training program was capped by the Basic Airborne Course. The BAC provided the class the Airborne wings that added to the repertoire of skills needed prior to deployment. On 14 December 1994, the 1st Chapter of the Army Group journey ended.

Chapter 2 - Cutting Edge of the Army. On 02 January 1995, majority of the Army Group with deployment bags in tow, boarded C-130 enroute to the different mission areas for deployment, the start of their field duties.



The security environment in the mid-90s saw the CPP-NPA-NDF pursue its rectification campaign, the heightened attack of the MILF and the rise of the Abu Sayyaf Group. The security situation worsened in the late 90s and ended in an all-out war against the MILF in Central Mindanao. Throughout this volatile security situation, the Army Group was deployed in the field acting as Platoon Leader, Company Commander and Battalion/ Brigade Staff. The field experience during this time changed the entire perspective of the group and the manner they perceived the words "Securing the Land and Serving the People". Majority of the members of the Army Group came face to face with the realities of serving in the field both in combat and other equally important line of operations of the army (Intelligence Operations, Stakeholder Engagements, Information Operations, Legal Cooperation and International Defense Security Engagement). Throughout these deployments, the group lived-up to be the Army's cutting-edge by providing services to the people in the countryside and leading the fight against the enemy of the state.

At this point, majority of the group members saw themselves marrying the girl of their dreams, some were their Kaydet girls while most were new found sweethearts in the field. Alongside with their service to the nation, they started to make a home for their families, a dual task that made them genius in striking a balance between service and family life. On the other hand, a number of the Army Group paid the ultimate sacrifice of offering their lives for peace.

Chapter 3 - Learning the Rudiments of the Jungles called Headquarters. The cutting-edge chapter in the Army Group's journey gave them the tools to assume different staff positions at Division, HPA, GHQ and AFPWSSUs. Some of the members opted to specialize in the field of intelligence, logistics, finance and information technology while others opted to serve in the civilian sector and some migrating to other countries pursuing a different line of work together with their families. The challenging staff work



in the urban jungles of HPA and GHQ taught them the rudiments of completed staff work and the dynamics of working at higher headquarters level where pencil pushing were done by Captains and Majors. This period was also marked by constant get together wherein families of the Army Group developed a bond that became a constant source of strength of each member. It also saw the Army Brats getting closing together with the Air Force and the Navy Brats. Overall, this chapter provided the Army Group the privilege of learning the rudiments of staff work and the time to re-group and build a greater family called – the Bantay Laya Family composed of their spouses and children.

Chapter 4 – Leading the Front. Equipped with valuable lessons from the field and the rudiments of staff work, the Army Group was ready to take on another challenge – leading the front as Battalion Commanders. From 2016-2017, majority of the Army Group were assigned in the different PA Major Units and some had the opportunity to serve in Mindanao. The AFP's main effort in confronting insurgency and terrorism threats are the Eastern Mindanao Command (EMC) and Western Mindanao Command (WMC). Most of the Battalion Commanders were members of the Army Group where they provided leadership to the maneuver Battalions (Infantry, SOCOM and Armor) and Combat Support and Service Support Battalions confronting the NPA and terrorist groups (BIFF, Maute Group and ASG). While those Battalion Commanders in Visayas and Luzon were equally brilliant in leading their units employing different line of operations. The campaign in CARAGA and Davao regions against the NPAs gained ground with Army Group at the forefront of the campaign that resulted to neutralization, capture, surrender of the NPA leadership and its ranks and file and the clearing of two guerilla fronts.



On the other hand, the campaign in Zamboanga-Basilan-Sulu (ZAMBASUL) was spearheaded by the Army Group having commanded the 16lB, 18lB, 32lB, 35lB, 41lB, 44lB, 53lB, 64lB, 68lB, 74lB, 8FAB, 2SRB, 5SRB, 2SFB, 4SFB and 6SFB.

During the liberation of Marawi City from the control of Maute and ASG terrorist groups, the Army Group was again in the thick of the fight to clear the city of DAESH-inspired terrorist groups. They commanded the Special Operations Forces, Infantry Maneuver Battalions, Cavalry Squadron and Mechanized Battalion, Field Artillery Battalions and Engineer Combat Battalions. These units figured prominently in the liberation of Marawi City. Suffice to say, the major urban battle of the AFP was fought with most of the Battalion Commanders belonging to the Army Group, PMA Bantay Laya Class of 1994. A

humbling experience for them to be given the privilege of fighting together and alongside with other equally great leaders and graduates of PMA.

The Army Group is humbled and honored to still have **75 members** serving in different capacities in the Armed Forces of the Philippines.

These colorful chapters in the Army Group's journey is a testament that its members live-up to the Army Ethos of Honor, Patriotism and Duty. They have remained steadfast to their sworn duty of Serving the People and Securing the Land. Others who opted to pursue equally important callings outside the military service are all living-up to the ideals of **Courage, Integrity and Loyalty** that has become the way of life for these fine gentlemen who volunteered to join the Army 25 years ago.



NAVY GROUP - THE GUARDIANS OF THE SEA

On 06 April 1994, after a month of momentary hibernation from the rigid and arduous academic and military training, seventy members of PMA Class of 1994 reported to the Philippine Navy as student Officers to undergo the 137th Naval Officers Qualifications Course "A at the Naval Education and Training Command, San Antonio, Zambales. Historically the largest batch to graduate at PMA, the challenge of synchronizing the mixtures of different PMA Company cultures/traditions coupled with individual attitudes and dispositions have graciously enriched the adaptation of the young Officers into a strong and united Bantay Laya Navy Group that allowed them to survive the rigors of NOQC life and beyond.



The thrilling and life-changing experience that highlighted the transcendental adventure of these young officers in their NOQC phase was the first-ever ASEAN Tour embarked by PN in May to June 1994 in order to expose the promising naval officers to the different navies of the world and learn the vibrance and intricacies of the naval service. Aboard the newest cargo ship of the Philippine Navy, the LCC 550, the group was able to visit four (4) countries of destinations, such as Sattayip, Thailand; Changi, Singapore; Surabaya, Indonesia, and Port Klang, Malaysia. It was indeed "lifechanging" since it did not only allow the Officers to explore the wonders of the ocean world, but it also provided them the compass to determine their specific field of professions, whether to pursue the fleet-bound career as White Cap Officers or the ground-striking force as Marine Officers. Hence, after their completion of the NOQC "A", 38 of the Bantay Laya Navy Group chose to stay in the Fleet Force, 21 joined the "the few, the proud" Philippine Marine Corps while 11 of them chose to continue their career with the Philippine Coast Guard.

The Navy Group was basically divided in to three sub-groups (PN, PMC, PCG) and its members spread all over the Philippine archipelago in pursuing their sworn duties and mandates. Those who joined the Philippine Fleet went aboard ship and completed their junior billets as Mess and Supply Officers, Deck and Gunnery

Officers, and Engineering and Damage/ Control Officers in various naval platforms in all parts of the country including the infamous Spratly Islands. During these times, some White Cap Officers have preferred special fields of profession, such as the Naval Air Group, Naval Special Operations Group, and Intelligence while some continued to finish their Executive Officer billets with only a few pursued their Commanding Officers billets. On the other hand, some opted to be part of the Corps of Professor. Unavoidably, the White Caps (both PN and PCG) and the Marines have intermittently crossed paths in their assignments or deployments. Local and foreign schoolings, like the Naval Staff Courses, Basic and Advanced Intelligence Courses,

Finance and Logistic Courses, General Staff Courses, and the Master in National Security Administration, have brought opportunities to the members of the group to rekindle the spirit of camaraderie and friendship that have manifestly characterized the Bantay Laya Navy Group.

Inevitably, there are those who chose paths outside of the armed service either they resigned or retired early from the service and engaged in business or other private employment.

The Navy group through 25 years, also remembers and honors the company of their dear departed Sailors and Marine Mistahs who joined the Creator ahead of them.

Now, out of the original 71 strong members, only 41 have remained to continue their service, most of whom are occupying important and sensitive positions in the PN, PCG, PMC and Corps of Professors.

MARINE WARRIORS

The original 21-strong Bantay Laya Marine Group were volunteers out of the 71 total Bantay Layans who joined the Navy Group. After undergoing the successive courses of Naval Officers Qualification Course "A" and the Mess and Supply Officers Course, they reported to the Headquarters of the Philippine Marines for the



mandatory Marine Officers Orientation Course (MOOC). The MOOC was subsequently followed by the conduct of Marine Basic Airborne Course, most of them lived and survived to finish the tough training, while others chose to forego of copping the coveted wings and just went directly to the line Battalions. By mid-1990s, all Bantay Laya Warriors were scattered in the different Marine units in Quezon, Sulu, Palawan, Zamboanga, Tawi-Tawi, and Basilan as Platoon Commanders.

The first major campaign that the Bantay Laya Marines actively participated was the "all-out war" against the Moro National Liberation Front in 2000. Soon after, the Marine Warriors went on different schoolings for career advancement; undergoing courses in intelligence, logistics and other courses. During this period, a number of them decided to

went out of the service and trotted their way in the private sector performing security-related jobs.

The years of these Marine Warriors of Class 1994 faithfully serving inside and outside the Corps have made them what they are now, valuable assets of the military service.

For over two decades of service in the Marine Corps and with the private sector, the Marine Warriors have proven to be best in whatever position or job they occupy. These unparalleled individuals were not only "ripened" through time but were honed by experienced and made tougher by wisdom.

AIR FORCE GROUP - THE GUARDIANS OF THE SKY

The Air force group was chosen from the 241 strong members of Bantay Laya Class of 1994 with 54 strong and able-bodied individuals joined the Philippine Air Force.

After graduation on 06 March 1994, the group was given a month long vacation and reported back to Villamor Air Base and given the marching orders to report to different tactical flying units. The 54 Bantay Layans were divided into five groups. The first ten was placed on Detached Service for OJT to the 5th Fighter Wing, the second group of ten went to 15th Strike Wing, the third group composed of 11 went to 100th Training Wing, another group of 11 went to 220th Air Lift Wing and the remaining 12 went to 205th Tactical Operations Wing.

It was during those deployments where the ingenuity of the members of the Air Force group came into being. Ingenuity on how to survive with less money on their pockets as salaries were given in advance and most of them gave it to their families and leaving just enough money for deployment.

Each group had their own stories to tell but the most common of it was the way they reported to their billet area in their respective training assignments. They were walking like "mga itik, sunudsunuran sa inahin." The "inahin" was the marcher and responsible for the group.

After a month, the group was sent to undergo BAFOC and everyone was excited to share stories of their experiences in different tactical wings. Their time at the Flying School in Lipa was a time to bond with their Mistah and spent majority of their time playing, drinking and going out. They gave the weekend warrior term a new meaning where practically more than half of the class stayed over the weekend at TOQs. The group was billeted in two areas: TOQ3 and TOQ5 where each had their peculiar experiences to share. These bond developed their camaraderie and strengthen it that until now, they are still very strong in terms of connections



and bonding.

At flying school, they flew the T-41D under the 101st Primary Training Squadron and finished it on time, however, when they were about to be transferred to 102^{nd} training squadron when an unfortunate event happened that led to revision of training program. This time they were divided into three group: the fixed wing group, the MG group and the Huey Group and were made to specialize on their chosen field of specialization. Those who wanted to be instructor pilots, OV-10 pilots and airlift pilots went to the fixed wing group, 19 went to the huey group (205th TOW) and the rest joined the 15th SW and the rest joined the MG group.

After graduation from flying school, 23 joined the 15^{th} SW, 19 to 205^{th} TOW, 4 to the 5^{th} FW, 3 to the 220^{th} AW and 5 to the 100^{th} TW. After a few months in deployment, the 505^{th} SRG was activated and few Mistah from the 205^{th} TOW and the 15^{th} SW opted to join 505^{th} SRG.

Years past and majority pursue a progressive pilot career and joined the civilian aviation. Two resigned from the service and joined their wives abroad, few were in general aviation and majority were bus drivers (airbus of PAL and Cebu Pac). Of the 54 members of the Air Force Group, 22 are still in the service, five in general aviation, two are OFWs working for Hongkong Air and Viet Air, three are in the United States, three just faded in the limelight, two are with Cebu Pacific and the rest are with the Philippine Airlines.

Majority of those who stayed in the service were given the opportunity to study and train abroad ranging from few weeks of training and seminars to a longer period for a Master's degree and professional military education. Five graduated from MNSA, three took its equivalent abroad, one is still ongoing, five took their GSC abroad and three took their SOC from abroad.


Twenty-five years after graduation and the Air Force Group is already holding positions of major responsibility. Those who left the service or retired early are also enjoying their lives for their selfless service as bus drivers and stick, collective and pedal pushers. n the 1st of April 1985, 330 young men from the 7,641 islands of the Philippine Archipelago – each with their own diverse cultures, beliefs, norms, traditions, and reasons – reported to Fort Del Pilar, Baguio City; comprising the PMA Class of 1989. Of the 72 in the active service, 44 mistahs joined the star rank Officers Corps, while 28 mistahs have yet to join as well.

Not to be outdone is PSupt Mario Sinocruz, who because of his unquestionable dedication and devotion to PRO2 and the Cordilleras, opted to remain thereat no matter what. He refused to undergo further schooling and disregarded taking the necessary eligibility which should have been easy for him. He is looking forward to a peaceful retirement in the hinterlands, ample preparation indeed. Of course, we have also distinguished members of the class who retired from the service upon reaching the mandatory age of 56 years. PSSupt Edwin Paras, better known as Kuya Ed by his circle of friends, retired in 2017. Finding a passion in the business sector, and helping in the economic growth and development of the country, PSSupt Erwin Robles opted to retire early. He is now used to traveling around the world, looking for better business opportunities.

The trials and persecutions were likewise felt. The hazards of the profession hit PSupt Dionisio C Borromeo and PSSupt Eduardo P Acierto. We are hoping and praying that they will be soon be cleared of allegations and charges.

Looking back some 30 years today, 26 young and dashing Second Lieutenants of the PMA Makatao Class of 1989 joined the regular Officer Corps of the Philippine Constabulary – then under the Armed Forces of the Philippines, as one of its major services. Due to the pressing challenges on peace and order at that time, brought about by the insurgents and the southern secessionist groups, the PC leadership decided that the entire PC Group undergo further the Special Ranger Course, with the PC Special Action Force prior to deployment in war-torn areas. Unfortunately, in the course of the training, we suffered our first casualty. 2Lt Perfecto Sagun succumbed to a gunshot wound in the head.

The first combat casualty of the PC group was 2Lt Allan B Flores, whose Company encountered heavily armed dissidents in the Davao Region. Though his Company was outnumbered, they were never outfought; but it cost him his life, a supreme sacrifice for the love of country and fellowmen.

In 1991, barely two years in the active service, RA 6975 was passed – creating the Philippine National Police. Three members of the Class opted to remain with the Armed Forces of the Philippines, viz:

Thus, 22 members of the Class were absorbed into the Philippine National Police as Inspectors; then later, the ranks readjusted to Police Senior Inspector. As we valiantly confront the challenges in the police force that is national in scope and civilian in character, PSupt Hammurabi P Geonzon and PCI Manuel L Chu optionally retired from the service. Both members migrated to the land of milk and honey, USA.

For our adopted PNP MAKATAO: 1. Antonio "TIWAY" Salamat Jr Proprietor, ALCS Trading/ALCS Transport; and 2. Atty Rolly Claveria who is with San Miguel Corporation.

Makatao Army Group @ 30: Staying Strong and United Amidst Diversity by Jun Torres

The Makatao Army group currently has a total of 60 members to include regular and honorary. Thirty-six are still in the active service while sixteen have retired. We also have eight other members who are with the civilian sector.

Majority of those in the active service are holding key positions in the field and directly involved in counter-insurgency and counter-terrorism. Currently, we have 12 Brigade Commanders, two of whom are in Luzon: Greg Almerol of 903rd Inf Bde in Sorsogon and Rowen Tolentino of 703rd Inf Bde based in Nueva Ecija. At the Mindanao's Eastern front are four Makataos. Jun Torres maintains the peace in Davao City and Davao del Norte as 1003rd Inf Bde Commander. Manny Sequitin as Commander of 701st Inf Bde, spearheads the operations from Mati, Davao Oriental, the southernmost tip of the country, "Where the sun shines first". And the area considered as the melting pot and crossroad of all threat groups is ably being handled by Don Bajao as the TF GenSan Commander. And ensuring that units are always in step with the Eastern Mindanao Command's campaign is John Oberio as the Command's Inspector General.

At the NCR, you can find Marvin Licudine as he leads JTF-NCR as its Deputy Commander. Also at GHQ is Leo Ramoran as the Chief, AFP Finance Center. He is now very excited to discover what retirement brings, and is ready to join Danbar Barotilla who retired compulsorily last year. Danbar presently lives happily in the fruit basket town of Oriental Mindoro as a full-time employee of DBM (Driver, Bodyguard and Masahista ni Au). With them at NCR is Kiram Grajo, the Deputy Commander of HHSG, PA. He claims to be, "enjoying every work being given to me in the remaining days of my active service and keeping myself fit to enjoy my coming retirement". Also with the HHSG is Roger Migote who at the time of this writing is recovering from an ailment.

Nick Suemith actively reconnected with the class. He now is the Deputy G6, PA and has a son graduating from PMA in 2022. Likewise, Mel Recaido has rejoined us and now heads the Security and Escort Battalion at HPA. Busy providing elite combat troops for the campaign in defeating various threat groups is Ranger William Gonzales, Commander of the FSRR. He wants us to bear this in mind, "If you are looking for a real action 'ranger standard' you can find me in Camp Tecson, San Miguel, Bulacan". Three are based in Australia, namely: Leo Asuncion, who is with Accenture, Australia New Zealand, Defense and National Security Account; Ricky Carlos runs his own business in Melbourne; while Bayani Fernandez has a unique twist in his military career. In 2008, he joined the Australian Army with the Royal Australian Engineers, where he became the Senior Project Officer at Infrastructure Division. Currently, he is a Liaison Officer of the Australian Defence Force to the AFP, relaxing at a nice condo in Greenbelt.

Mon Tampil is a migrant to the Emerald Isle, Ireland. He sustains as a quality control for Customer Relations of Hertz Dublin. And more than anything else, he asserts to be a follower of Yeshoah (Jesus Christ). In Canada, Jess Rosete works as a Quality Control Officer of Canadian Auto Worker. And also living in Canada with his family is Emil De Leon.

The PMA Makatao Class of 1989 Air Force Group Story by Toto Dela Pena

The flight of the Air Force Group of the PMA Makatao Class of 1989 took-off immediately after graduating on 19 February 1989. Ten (10) Makataos out of the 113 members of Class 1989 reported to Headquarters Philippine Air Force, Villamor Air Base in 19 March 1989, after the customary one-month academic break.

While waiting for flight training, the group was assigned for On-the-Job Training (OJT) to various PAF units. On 07 May 1989, the Group got its first glimpse of their future as pilots when they reported to the 100th Training Wing, Fernando Air Base, Lipa City, Batangas. There, they were made to undergo the Admin Officers' Course at the PAF Technical Training Center also in FAB from 24 May 89 to 21 Jul 89. After completing the Admin Officers' Course, the Group reported to the PAF Flying School on 22 July 1989 joined by five other Student Officers (SOs) and 35 Aviation Cadets (ACs) to comprise the Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) of the PAFFS Class of 1991.

During the UPT, the Flyboy Makataos went through the rigors of soloing the Cessna T-41D aircraft, completing the Primary Phase of Flight Training by 1990. Due to the lack of SF-260M Basic Trainer aircraft, the Class was made to undergo Specialization Training. Manifesting their desire to serve with their mistahs in the field, the Group signified to fly the UH-1H and the newly acquired McDonnel Douglas MD-520MG Defenders. Six (6) SOs, 2Lt Dela Peña, 2Lt Macasaet, 2Lt Rayos, 2Lt Marquez, 2Lt Mendoza and 2Lt Villanueva (of OCS Class 1 and an adopted Makatao) along with other ACs volunteered to undergo specialization training under US-Trained Instructor Pilots in the MD-520MG Defenders in FAB, Lipa City while 2Lt Peralta, 2Lt Bihag, 2Lt Cabe, 2Lt Tianchon and 2Lt Cristobal chose to fly the UH-1Hs of the 205th Tactical Helicopter Wing and completed

their specialization in Villamor Air Base. After the specialization course from 11 Apr 1991 to 30 May 1991, the Air Force Group Makataos had their graduation on 01 July 1991, simultaneous with the Air Force Day, with Lt Dela Peña graduating number 1 out the 49 pilots of PAFFS Class 1991.

All the ten Air Force Makataos honed their mettle in the field of combat, either as attack pilots of the 15th Strike Wing or as combat pilots of the 205th Tactical Helicopter Wing. All flew combat missions and fought during the height of the AFPs counter-insurgency campaigns throughout the archipelago in the 1990s. The ten men-in-blue were later joined by Lt Canlas and Lt Dela Torre, who opted to join the Air Force when the Philippine Constabulary was dissolved and reorganized into the Philippine National Police in 1990. Lt Canlas graduated as Top of PAFFS Class 1993 and became an accomplished Instructor Pilot of the 100th TW, teaching many a would-be Air Force pilots the wonders of soaring the big blue skies. Cpt Mendoza, who became an IP after his stint with the 15th Strike Wing, later joined him.

As the Makatao fly-boys climbed the Air Force leadership ladder and occupied various positions of responsibility, their accomplishments further cemented their service reputation as silent but reliable workers, quietly but professionally performing their duties with excellence and dedication. Along the way, two Makatao airmen paid the ultimate sacrifice, 1Lt Glenn B Bihag in a fatal crash of their UH-1H helicopter while conducting re-supply to army units fighting in the highlands of Napaliran, Balingasag, Misamis Oriental and LTC Ferdinand T Macasaet PAF (GSC) who was fatally shot in Loakan, Baguio City.

The flying acumen of Makatao flyers was also recognized when Jerry Cabe and Caloy Cristobal became Presidential Pilots of the 250th Presidential Airlift Wing. Later, Nesty Rayos and Toto Dela Peña also got assigned as Directors for Operation of the 250th PAW. As the PMA Makatao Class of 1989 celebrates its 30th Graduation Anniversary, their destinies continue to unfold before them. Starting 2017, the much-coveted stars have fallen upon the shoulders of Makatao Air Force Group as they occupy positions of command, to wit: Toto Dela Peña as Wing Commander, 15th Strike Wing based in Sangley Pt., Cavite City, who earned it during his stint as WC, Tactical Operations Wing Western Mindanao (the air component of WESTMINCOM during the Marawi Siege); Leo Peralta as WC, 420th Supply Wing; Nesty Rayos as WC, TOW West (formerly, 570th Composite Tactical Wing), Puerto Princesa, Palawan and about to assume his next assignment as Assistant Superintendent, PMA; the latest to fall is the star of Cris Marquez as WC, TOW Western Mindanao. Starmen-in-waiting are Connor Canlas as the Chief of the AFP Procurement Service, an O-7 position, after being Acting Wing Commander of the Tactical Operations Wing Northern Luzon and Brigadier Larry Tianchon, Commander of the Joint Task Force Malampaya based in El Nido, Palawan, also an O-7 position. Meanwhile, Aldrick Dela Torre is educating future senior leaders of the AFP as Chief of Staff of the AFP CGSC and Lito Villanueva is still powering PAF Transformation and rebuilding of Marawi's as DWC of the 355th Aviation Engineer Wing based in Basa Air Base. Makatao Aviators who continue to fiercely advance national development by pumping in foreign currency to the Philippine economy are: Jerry Cabe is in Libya flying Bell412s of Gulf Helicopters based in Qatar; Paul Mendoza is flying the Airbus A330 with Hong Kong Air Cargo Limited, an affiliate of Hong Kong Airlines with long haul flights to Europe, USA and parts of Asia; and last but not the least, Caloy Cristobal in the cockpit of PAL Airbus plying regional airways.

We continue to pray for the success of mistahs and their families as well as our mistahs who have joined the Great Pilotin-Command in the big blue yonder. May the Lord Almighty continue to shine His Divine blessings to those who have chosen to follow the difficult paths in the service of the Filipino nation as the Air Force Group of PMA Makatao Class of 1989.

PMA 89 Navy Group at 30" by Ariel Caculitan

As the navy takes its course towards a modernizing navy – one that is strong and credible, that our maritime nation can be truly proud of – its precious fleet marine officers of the PMA class '89 have been in the frontline and significantly contributing in this noble aspiration.

We are Leaders in a Calling that Requires Us to Die

(Speech of Senator Gregorio B. Honasan at the PMAAAI Fellowship Dinner and Christmas Party at the Social Hall, Valle Verde IV Clubhouse on 8 December 2018)

avalier Del Lorenzana, Cavalier Ed Año, Cavalier Jimmy de los Santos, Cavalier Edgar Aglipay, Mr. Kevin Tan, Dr. Francis Canuto, members and officers of the PMAAAI, class presidents, members of the long gray line and their ladies, brothers in arms, fellow Filipinos, thank you for the honor and privilege of allowing me to share this evening with you.

I have divided what I want to share with you into four parts: where we have been in terms of our recent history; where we are; the way forward; and some reflections.

Where we have been

There have been three defining moments in our recent history which have provided opportunities for meaningful change: the ongoing insurgency, the declaration of martial law in 1972, and the 1986 People Power Revolution. We continue to have the longest running insurgency in Southeast Asia. Martial law tried to instill national discipline, political unity, social cohesion, and patriotism that would result in national security, pride, and economic prosperity.

Morale in the AFP and PNP was high—until there was a palpable diminution of control, partly because the Commander in Chief had health issues which nobody could validate. It was during this time that the Reform Movement within the Armed Forces of the Philippines was born.

The 1986 People Power Revolution was for good government and reform, and not against anything or anybody.

Expectations were high that there would be improvements in a system that continued to breed inefficiency, corruption, and disorder. Instead, we just changed personalities, with very little re-engineering to arrest institutional damage.

Consequently, unrest in the military continued, characterized by military uprisings all the way to the start of the millennium.

Part of our recent history has been the removal of two presidents by People Power in the streets, and the incarceration of two, showcasing our achievements as a democracy in progress. Were these political shortcuts good for the country and our democracy?

Our national heroes—personified by Rizal, Bonifacio, and others—were imperfect men who together dreamed of a Filipino nation which did not exist at the time. Yet our history as a people is a story of robustness more than resilience. We have tried to move forward, have stumbled at times, and have persevered on our chosen path.

Where we are

Ours is a beautiful country, and we are a good and gifted people. Many observe that our land is so blessed that, our shared problems and situation notwithstanding, all we need to do is continue breathing, and we wake up each day to find our economy growing by 6 to 7 percent.

But this is quickly followed by the commentary that as a people, "We never miss an opportunity to miss an opportunity."

Like many young democracies and developing countries, we are confronted with damage to institutions, many of which have become inefficient, unprofessional, subjective, partisan, and corrupt.

In governance, we have been relegated to perpetual medium-term policy planning, at the expense of continuity, sustainability, and predictability, leading to long-term instability.

Our front-line LGUs are driven by a local government code that has devolved authority



and responsibility, without the wherewithal and support required to effectively empower them. Corruption at all levels is an issue that must be confronted by strengthening control mechanisms embodied in our internal revenue, auditing, and local government codes, which need overdue amendments.

We also have a non-existent political party system.

The way forward

The first responsibility of any government is the maintenance of order. National defense and security, drugs, criminality, and terrorism are everyone's concern.

To respond to the institutional damage and systemic defects, we should not answer just the question "Who?" but also, "What?" Technology and energy self-sufficiency must be included in the way forward.

Faster, cheaper if not free, and secure connectivity must be made available through policy that will impact on government's ability to harness the power of information and communications technology, to unite our people and move them forward.

Energy self-sufficiency must be achieved to break our bondage to oil producers. We have oil in our undisputed territory. We just don't yet have the technology and financial capability to produce oil, which requires initiatives towards joint undertakings for oil exploration, sharing, and use.

Reflections

Whatever paths we have followed after our military service, our defining moments will always be when we wore the uniform with pride, dedication, and honor.

The two oldest professions are prostitution and the bearing of arms. There were periods in the history of many countries when we could not tell the difference. We are not an exception.

Professional soldiers cannot afford the luxury of an ego. That is a luxury a country cannot afford in its military leaders. We are soldiers, and a soldier's honor is obedience. In my case, I take orders—but, as you know from my life, only up to a certain point.

I was orphaned by my refusal to wait before change happened. I was orphaned by my decision to make things happen regardless of the political calendar.

We must learn not to wait for elections for change to happen. We must motivate the elected to make the changes between elections. We must remind the elected that if they will not make the needed changes, the people will make these changes for them. My success in four senatorial elections as the first true independent in Philippine political history was always a victory of this principle of popular self-help—and popular impatience. This country cannot afford to wait.

My candidacy brought a great moment in our history back onto the national stage. What is the role of courage in a country? That is the question to which four days in February 1986 gave the answer.

On a personal note: I had to explain this to my daughters. I did not see too much of them. It is hard to be with children while on the run. In the end, they realized that they are a soldier's daughters.

It is right and proper to remember the declaration of martial law on September 21, 1972 and vow, after its excesses, never again. It is more right, more fitting, and more useful to commemorate four days in February when we, the people, and the army stood as People Power for real change and good government.

This may be the last time I will stand on a national platform to deliver a message to you and the Filipino people, so let me tell you: Yes, we can change. Yes, we can change even a bad, cruel, even the most hard-headed government.

No, we don't have to wait and hope for change to happen when we can act now with courage. When soldiers and the Filipino people get together under moral leadership, real change will happen. Remember: Nothing is forever.

We cannot give what we do not have. My platform, our platform, must revolve around one thing: security. We look to harmony in our families, cooperation in our communities, order in the state, inclusive progress for our nation, and security in our shores.

We must look to the cultivation and preservation of our country's most precious resource: our children. I do not, however, like the old, empty platitude that our children are our future. They are not; they are their own future.

But they won't have a future if we don't protect that future, if we don't foster it, if we don't nurture our children to be healthy and teach them by example to be brave and strong. They won't have a future if we do not teach them to be disciplined and therefore dependable, and if we do not enable them through education to be the best they can be. As soldiers, we have seen and experienced what can be achieved with unity and courage and unflagging resolve to win, regardless of the odds.

Farmers, teachers, OFWs, workers in industry and trade, doctors and nurses, office workers, small businessmen, government employees—in sum, the common folk from whom we came, and whom we have never left behind: it is government's first duty to protect them from crime, exploitation, and abuse, from hunger, disease, joblessness, and standstill traffic; from drugs, and from ignorance born of poor education, when quality education is guaranteed by the constitution, and demanded by common sense for the greater good of the nation.

After 17 years as a soldier, seven years as a rebel, 20 years as a senator—yes, after 44 years of public service, I want to go home to family, to community, to country, where there should be peace, unity, prosperity, food, clothing, shelter, education, health, and self-fulfillment for everyone.

I can go home tomorrow to all these things. I have a wonderful family. But that would not be home as I see it, for my home is my country, my family is my people. As soldiers we have been taught never to leave anyone behind, that no one is saved if some are lost, and that this nation under God shall prevail against its worst enemies at home, which should be enough to take care of our enemies abroad. A strong nation is never defeated. Look at history. Look at little Israel, or little Singapore.

I want to go home to my family and the country I believe we all envision our country should be. And I will fight anybody who gets in the way. I love my children and I wish to be with thembut only for as long as duty permits. I do not relish the thought of dying in my bed, an old man forgotten, a fading warrior, waiting for his last taps.

I know how it feels to be abandoned. That is why I have never let anyone go. Others may fail me in that regard, but that is no excuse for me to be like them. I take the consequences of my actions always without regret, but never without learning a lesson. Okay, sometimes I am apprehended and detained, and I escape with my guards, but that also is a soldier's duty.

We should expect the elections to be clean, regardless of who may be the likely winner. Victory is in God's hands, but cheating is man's work. The answer to electoral fraud is not election protests; the answer to malicious prosecution is not a motion for reconsideration. The answer, brothers and sisters in arms, the answer lies in ourselves.

Just like most of you, I am neither distracted nor impressed by the voices of the prevalent organized hypocrisy, most of whom do not share the risk of a negative outcome. My 20 years in the Senate have exposed me to many who claim to know the military, how it thinks and how it acts.

I have stood at the gates of Malacañang Palace three times in my life in full combat gear, with no invitation except from my conscience. I didn't know how to proceed from there, but now the path seems clearer to me.

In my heart and mind, until you have been on both ends of a gun barrel, exposed to life and death in combat, felt hot metal projectiles entering your flesh, watched innocent men, women, and children maimed, or deprived of life, liberty, and property, you know nothing.

I remember what Merlin the wizard said to the young King Arthur: "Forget the past, define yourself in the present, and tomorrow you may lead."

We are leaders in a calling that requires us to die or do what is necessary in the performance of duty. No other vocation demands this ultimate sacrifice.

My late father, a soldier himself, told me once that leaders are needed before scholars are determined.

It is providential that the Yan family is co-sponsoring this historic affair, because I remember the late Amb. Manuel Yan, when he was AFP Chief of Staff, telling the Cadet Corps that the long gray line recognizes only two aristocracies: that of the brain and that of the brawn, which add up to the brand of leadership demanded by men in arms.

At times, in the dark before daybreak, I think I hear the echo of a distant bugle call and drums. My heart pounds, muscles in my arms, legs, and shoulders tense, and my hand grasps in the dark for the familiar feel of metal and oil—and I think for an instant, I am alive.

Tonight, cavaliers, my brothers in arms, as I stand before you, I am alive again. For God, country, and family. Thank you.

In this first issue of THE CAVALIER for 2019, I will be writing my last tribute to the last of the nine surviving BANATS of Class '51 (ten including myself).

Class '51 will always be a part of the history of the PMA. It is the class of interest to historians being the pioneer class when The Academy reopened in 1947. Eventually, historians will evaluate the record of Class '51 in the bigger context of the justification of the post-war PMA, its missions and objectives.

Invariably, in our social gatherings with fellow cavaliers, the question most often asked is how many of Class '51 are still living. This gave me the thought that the answer should not be a number but also a brief narration of who are these ten survivors and what they did for the service and their country. This is what I did for the past nine issues of THE CAVALIER. It was also my way of telling my classmates that I value their friendship and camaraderie borne of a common past from Camp Allen to Fort Del Pilar.

Now, I write my tribute to the man who was, who is, and will be the same Mike Villamor, the volunteer president for life of Class '51, the ever-cheerful, 100% extrovert who has erased the word NO from his vocabulary; and who holds the baton of the surviving members in the last tap of their earthly journey to eternity.

Let me quote from the GOLDEN SWORD of Class '51 a part of what was written about Mike which aptly describes him until the present.

"Mike in his cadet days as in his military and retired life, is as graceful in dancing as in knowing his way to people's hearts. Always smiling with a lively disposition, he creates an aura of mystique around him that makes you sympathetic to his cause. Above all, he is ready to lend a helping hand to those in need or in distress.

Being from the corn producing province of Cebu, he is always raring to go. Very active in his endeavors and seems to have a limitless cache of stamina that makes him go, go, and go. Wherever and whatever his job is, he religiously and perseveringly follows the dictates of his duties and never will you hear a word of complaint from him."

On his personal exploits, let me start with Mike as a "great lover." He holds the distinction as the only post-war cadet who won the heart of a young and beautiful, active duty Captain in the Nurse Corps who was the Chief Nurse of the PMA Dispensary (No Station hospital yet) as his OAO. No wonder Mike went on visiting privilege almost every week-end. I have yet to check the number of "sick calls" he made until graduation.

Mike was among the five "brave souls" of Class '51 who took the marriage plunge immediately after graduation bringing home a most coveted diploma and a blushing bride. When asked how they could survive with P180.00 monthly salary, their common reply was that "PAPA", the bride's papa, would take charge; except for Mike and Caring who could comfortably start a family with their combined incomes.

Here's a joke on what happened on their wedding night. Mike quite understandably was confused so that he thought it best to just follow the military tradition on the relationship between a senior and junior officer. Already in his birthday suit, he executed a snappy salute to his bride and asked "Ma'am, permission to mount" to which he got the instant reply, "Granted. Dismount on my order". The order to dismount never came. End of telenovela, courtesy of Colonel Titoy Belen, the present boss of Mike at the PEFTOK VETERANS ASSN.

Mike and Caring lived a full and happily married life for 29 years when sadly on 26 August 1980 Caring passed away. They have three children, all professionals and well-accomplished.

Mike at the age of 54, still had a long life to live and Caring true to her name, intimated to Mike not to mourn for her for the rest of his life.

Mike found new comfort in a second nuptial to an equally loving and caring,

beautiful young lass from Quezon City with a difference, that Tessie Garcia was a teenager. After all, it was Mike, not Bebs Regis, who remarried a teenager much later, who first found the "fountain of youth." You could see the effect of this marriage on Mike. At 93, he still works for a living, commuting daily from his residence in Antipolo to Escolta and back. Another factor contributing to his health is the environment where he lives. He "controls" a well-manicured backyard of some five hectares. Before doing your Arithmetic, let me clarify that Mike has a common boundary with the Antipolo Valley Golf and Country Club. Mike and Tessie also have three children, but Mike is continually challenged to make the 7th to break the equity.

Let me now write about Mike as a military professional. Mike was well-prepared to undertake all his assignments. He finished the ranger and special forces courses and the airborne course. He took his advanced Infantry course at the Ft. Benning, USA; the Command and General Staff Course in Fort Bonifacio; and obtained his Master's degree in National Defense College. He served in the anti-dissident campaign; had a stint in the Korean War with the 2nd BCT (PEFTOK); served as a Tactical officer at the PMA; became the "Governor" of Camp Aguinaldo; and commanded the 5th Inf Bde (Sep) for four years.

Mike talks of the hazard of being a Bde Commander located in Tarlac. He had a allot a bigger budget for gasoline because his unit is the favorite refueling stop-over of Cavaliers and friends going up to Baguio and back.

Mike was more active after retirement serving the government in various positions of responsibility. He worked with the Philippine National Bank, the FMIB, and the EEIB, and the Dangerous Drugs Board-all agencies of the Ministry of Finance. He is still connected with the MBZ International Customs Brokerage as consultant. He is an active member of the Board of the PEFTOK Veterans Assn. and the volunteer president for life of Class '51. Indeed, Mike has done for the Class '51 more than what is expected of each member.

On November 30, 2018, the PMAFFI comprising the Classes of '51, '52, '53,

and '54, celebrated their 25th Founding Anniversary at the Camp Aguinaldo Clubhouse. Noticeably, their numbers are dwindling but their spirit is high and their memories are long.

I believe that this group of classes, has exemplified the strongest bonds of kinship and camaraderie, borne out of a cloistered life for four years struggling to attain for themselves the highest standards of excellence and professionalism imposed by the Institution that will forever be their identity. 
